### SOCCER LOSES ON SHOOTOUT

The Dallas Soccer team defeated Lake-Lehman 8-1 last Wednesday then bowed 1-0 to the Abington Comets after the teams played eight periods and one shootout.

Both teams went into the battle for the conference championship undefeated with 13-0 records and it was only guessing in the shootout that gave the Comets the winning point.

Abington's Josie Rosencrance kicked in the last ball of the shootout past Dallas goalie Matt Butler but it was the Comets goalie Phil Spinka who kept the Dallas team from scoring in the overtime periods by saving their shots and by stopping Jeff Tinner's shot in the shootout.

Spinka's move to pretend he was going to the left for Tinner's shot but quickly moving to the right to stop the shot enabled the opportunity for Rosencrance to shoot for the score. Spinka also made some great leaps to save scoring by the Mountaineers Ken Klimovitz and Tinner.

In the game with Lake-Lehman, Dallas received balanced scoring from Eric Ursiak, Tinner and Darren Michaels with each of them scoring two goals and Ursiak and Tinner accounting for assists. Klimovitz and Ed Reabuck scored the other two goals and Klimovitz had four assists.

The Mountaineers will play the winner of the Lake-Lehman-Crestwood game, Thursday, 7:30 p.m., at the Valley West Stadium.

### FIELD HOCKEY OUT OF PLAYOFFS

Dallas girls field hockey team lost 3-1 Saturday morning in a game that went regulation time, two 10-minute overtimes and a shootout before the Knights were able to win 3-1.

### FIELD HOCKEY WINS IN OVERTIME

It took 60 minutes of regular game time and two sudden death 10 minutes overtime to break a 1-1 tie between the Lake-Lehman Knights and the Dallas Mountaineers before the two teams decided the win on a one-on-one shootout which gave the Lady Knights a 3-1 win to advance the 13-3-1 team to meet undefeated Crestwood for the District II AA title Saturday at the Third Avenue field.

The loss eliminated the 13-3 Dallas Mountaineers from further competition while the Knights will advance to the state playoffs whether they win or lose against the Red Comets.

The Mountaineers outshot the Knights 27-6 during regulation and the two overtimes but Jen Cook gave the Lake-Lehman team a 1-0 lead in the second half when she scored unassisted. Wendy Hozempa tied it up by coming back to score on her own rebound to prevent Cook's goal from giving the Knights the win.

Neither team was able to score in the two 10-minute overtimes so the game came down to the sudden death shootout in which the Knights outshot the Mountaineers by two to take the win.

After gaining a wild card spot in their playoff game with Walenpaupack last week, the Lake-Lehman Knights lost to the Dallas Mountaineers Wednesday in the semi-final soccer game.

## Mounts out of playoffs after loss to Hanover

Hanover's 21-14 upset over Dallas last Saturday is proof that the old adage 'never take a team too lightly' is very true. That's what it appeared the Mountaineers did Saturday on the winner's field.

"We were winning by a touchdown," Coach Ted Jackson said after the game. "We had two chances to score in the second quarter but the kids didn't do anything. They were down at the 10-yard line and couldn't take the ball in. Hanover played a good game, they were ready for us, and our defense was off."

"They made some costly mistakes and they had some penalties that hurt. Our offense fumbled and Hanover recovered which gave

them points and we had a roughing the kicker penalty that gave them life."

The Mountaineers play Bishop Hoban Friday night at Hoban's field. "Our kids better be ready. You can't underestimate a team because they are 0-6; Hanover was 2-5 and look how they played," Jackson said.

"Hanover had defeated only Hoban and Bishop O'Reilly. Anything can happen in this game. If our kids want to win they've got to work for it. You can't make mistakes and win ball games."

The Mountaineers took an early 6-0 lead in Saturday's game, set up by Barry Miller's 79 yards on two carries to put the ball on the one-yard line from where J.J. Straigis took it over for the score.

In the second quarter, Hanover's Erik Pearson hit Joe Per-

icci for a 59 yard gain to the Mounts 23-yard line to set up Jamie Proctor's score. Proctor ran down the left side of the field to score from the 23-yard line, then he kicked the extra point to give Hanover a 7-6 lead.

On their next possession, Dallas took the lead back with Straigis faking a pass to Miller then running around the right end to cover 40 yards and put the ball on the 27-yard line. Miller ended the drive when he took a pass from Straigis on the five yard line and went in for a touchdown.

On Hanover's kickoff, Dallas recovered a fumble and drove to Hanover's 20 yard line where it appeared they would go in for another score, but the Hanover defense tightened and the Mountaineers were unable to score. Then

on fourth and 16, Dallas was called for roughing the kicker which gave the Hawks a first down.

Pearson hit Dennis Monk with a 58-yard pass to the Dallas six yard line and three plays later John Heddings went over from the one yard line and a kick for the extra point gave Hanover a 14-12 lead.

In the third quarter Miller went 58 yards down the right side of the field to put Dallas on the 10 yard line but Hanover stopped the Mountaineers at the five-yard line.

When Hanover took over, Dallas downed Proctor in the end zone for two points to tie the game but Hanover recovered a fumbled ball on the kick and scored their final touchdown on a 14-yard pass from Pearson to Heddings. Proctor's kick was good and the game ended 21-14.


