Due to the lateness of the present season, the trophy this year will be awarded to the winning team in the annual Thanksgiving Day football classic between Dallas and Kingston Townships.


Each year, thereafter, the award will go to the most outstanding team in the area. It will be retained by that team until it is wor by a team with a better record




