## Last minute interception saves 6-0 win for Mounts

In a hard-fought finish to an up and down season, the Dallas Mountaineers came away from Saturday's Old Shoe game with a slim 6-0 victory over a tough Lake-Lehman team.

"Lake-Lehman came well prepared and they played great football the first half," said Dallas coach Ted Jackson. "They had several opportunities to score, but our kids hung with them in the first half."

"Sam Jayne was hurt all week and he made only three plays and had to come out of the game which

hurt us. It wasn't until the fourth quarter that our kids got things moving. Then Chris Ruth caught Straigls' pass for a 21 yard gain and a first down. We finally made the big play when Barry Miller took a pass from Straigls and ran for 30 yards to the Knights 28-yard line for a first down. Miller is a great big-play athlete. He's what everyone wants on a team."

Straigls and Miller gained more yardage for the Mountaineers to chalk up another first down and then on a fourth down and inches Straigls made the first down.

For most of the afternoon it seemed that the Knights and

Mounts would share the shoe for another year. Then Straigls used three downs to get to the two-yard line and on the next play took the ball in for six points.

Chris Williams kick hit the goal post and the Mountaineers were in front 6-0.

The Knights didn't give up and Sam Gorgone gave his team a first down at midfield on a quarterback keeper with less than three minutes remaining in the game.

On the next play Gorgone threw a long pass, but Miller intercepted at the 14-yard line. The Mountaineers were unable to get a first down and were forced to punt with less

than two minutes remaining.

Gorgone then heaved a long pass to Jim Chamberlain which put his Knights back in Mountaineer territory. Then Gorgone threw a pass to Mike Taylor two plays later for another first down with only seconds remaining.

Gorgone continued to put the ball in the air. After an incomplete pass and a pass to Jim Chamberlain who lost the ball when he was tackled by VanOrden in the end zone, Chris Ruth intercepted Gorgone's third pass to end the game Knight's threat.

## The origins of the Old Shoe game

Dallas resident Carol Kristan found this clipping from the November 19, 1948 Dallas Post in a Dallas Township High School yearbook she bought at an auction. It shows the starting lineups for a game between Dallas and Kingston Township high schools.

The accompanying story tells of the beginning of the "Old Shoe" game, which at that time was awarded to the Back Mountain team judged to have been the most outstanding during the season.

With the later school jointures, the Old Shoe has become an annual game between the two regional high schools.

The yearbook had belonged to Emily Goldsmith, long a teacher in Dallas Township. Kingston Township won the game 14-0, on a Statue of Liberty play in the fourth quarter.

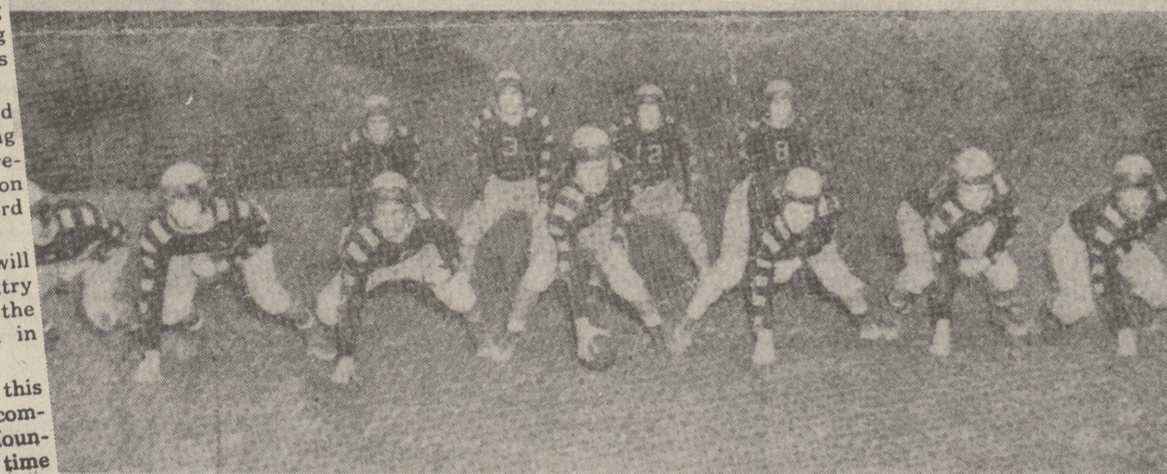
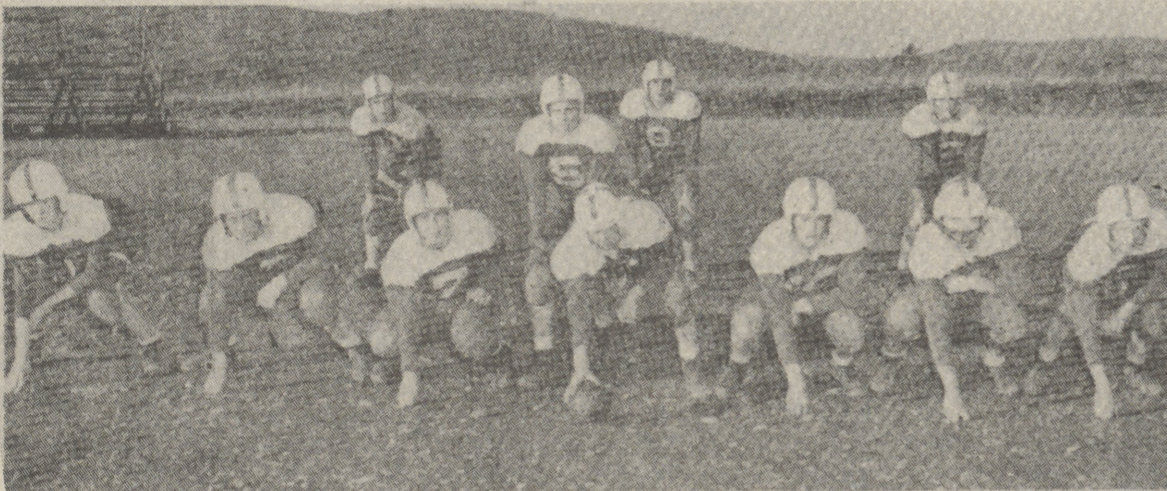
