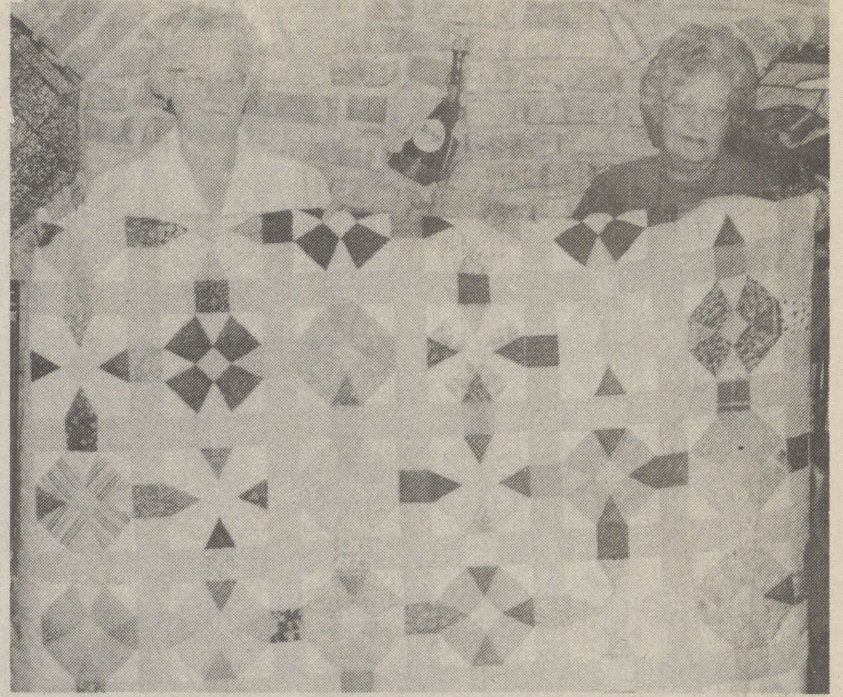

Jaycees to host 'Jaycee Family Week' activities

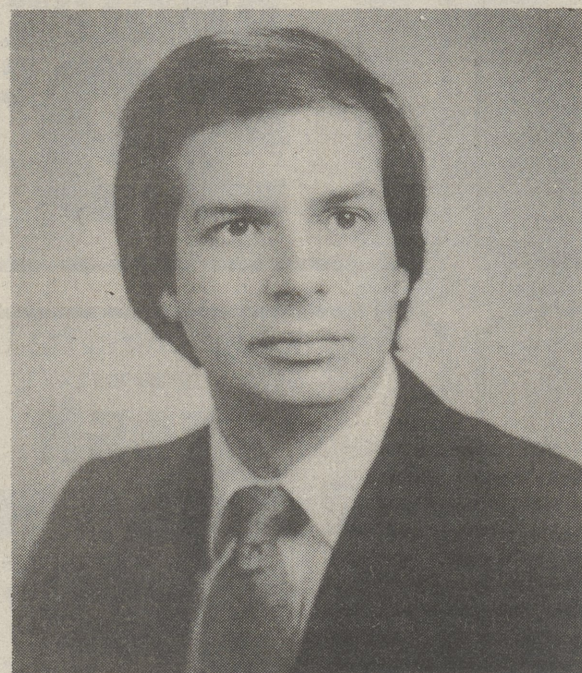

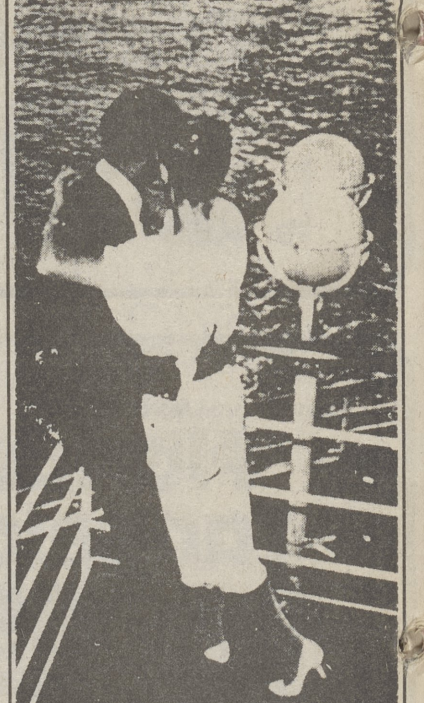
Dr. Brady is participating in both medicare and Blue Cross/Blue Shield and accepts most private insurances.
