Cytome Galovirus: Who is at risk and how dangerous is it?

Cytomegalovirus, or CMV, is one of the four types of herpes viruses. Many of us have it and don't even know it, and it is generally not harmful to adults. However, CMV can be extremely dangerous to newborns.

CMV was first identified in humans in 1956. You may have heard more about it recently because of its association with acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS). It has been known for some time that most gay men have CMV, which can be transmitted sexually or through the blood. Doctors now suspect that some of the complications of AIDS may be related to the fact that they have CMV.

But in most adults, CMV causes no symptoms or only mild mononucleosislike symptoms, including fever and fatigue. There is no treatment for it, but most adults recover on their own within two to four weeks, with bedrest.

Some immunosuppressed patients, such , as those with leukemia, can get CMV from the donor of bone marrow (or the donor of an organ in the case of transplant patients) and can die from the complications. Some clinicians are now recommending that all donors and recipients be checked for CMV first to avoid this risk.

Doctors are concerned about pregnant women who have symptoms associated with CMV. Pregnant women who get a fever or who feel unusually fatigued along with fever should be checked immediately for CMV. The earlier in pregnancy it strikes, the more danger there is to the infant. The newborn child of a CMV mother can suffer from a variety of problems--differing degrees of mental retardation, behavioral abnormalities and physical malformations.

Very recently a drug was discovered which may successfully treat CMV in adults, but it is not FDA approved yet and has not been extensively tested at this time.
