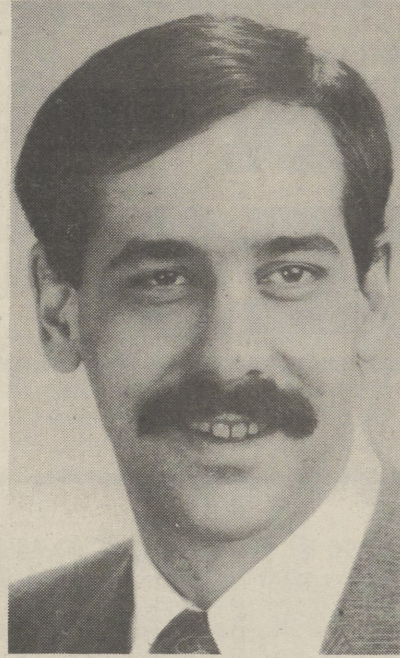
Morgan appointed C-TEC Cable Systems supervisor

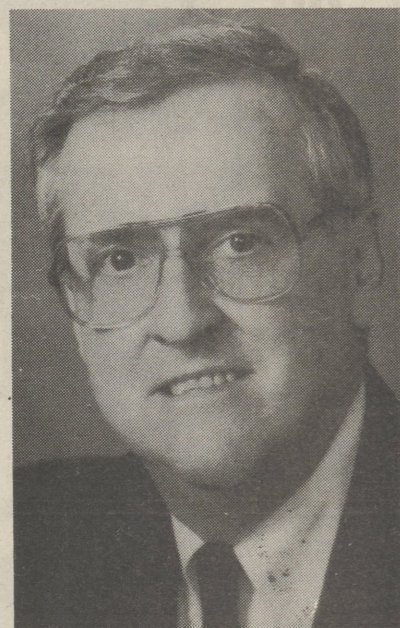

Both directors report to the CEO, Dr. Ryan.

Robinson, a Penn State graduate, brings extensive management and engineering experience from his career with Bell of Pa., where he most recently served as director of Engineering of the Northeast and Central Pa. regions.

Belk has served as director of University Relations at the campus since 1984, with a major assignment to organize fund-raising capabilities and direct the campus' first capital campaign—for a new Center for Technology. Under her leadership, the campus raised more monies from private sources than any of the 17 Commonwealth campuses. The capital campaign raised \$2.8 million dollars and the Annual fund grew from \$25,000 to over \$100,000, with her direction of a

Tickets for Boy Scout dinner still available

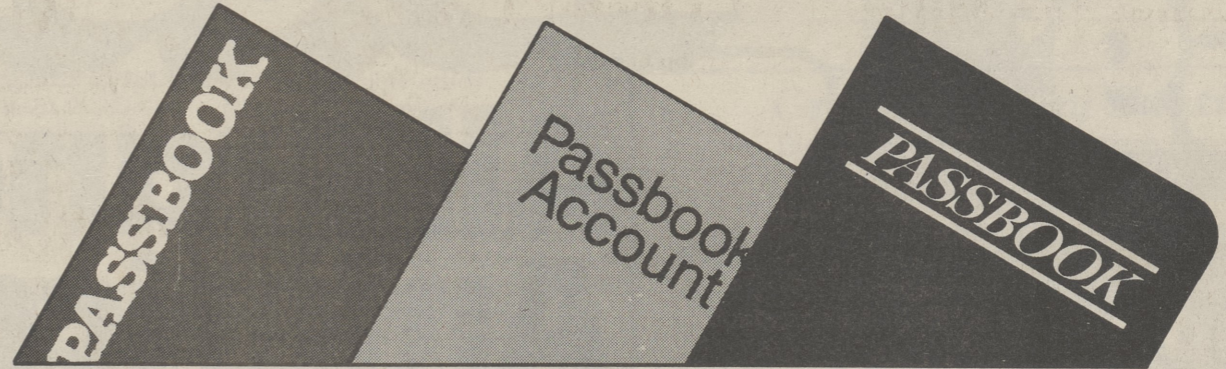

Ian Richardson, General Chairman for the dinner, announced

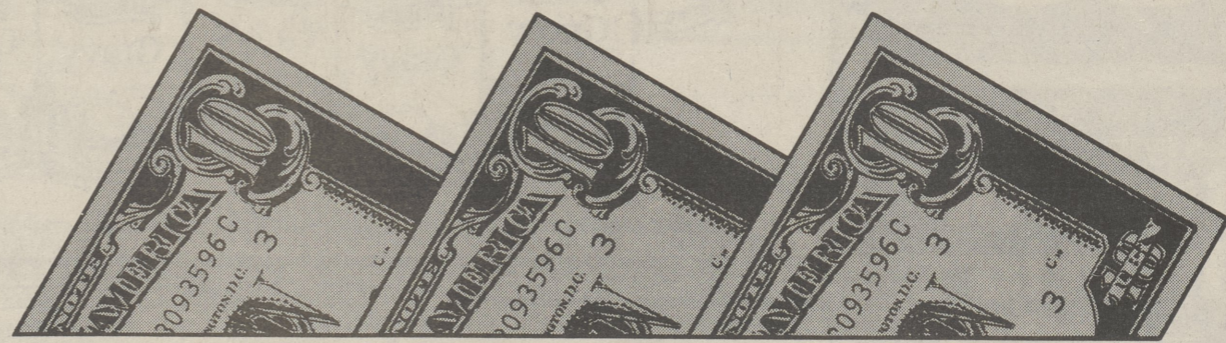
