

Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Code has updated the fine structure for violations of fishing and boating laws and regulations. House Bill 1989-102. The new law, which passed with strong support of Pennsylvania sportsmen, means that those breaking the law will pay stiffer fines in 1990.

The following are the highlights of the bill:

· Misuse of waters and property, both private and Commission owned—an increased fine from \$25 to \$50.

· Littering—an increase from \$25 to \$25 plus \$10 per item. · A new fine for household refuge-\$50 plus \$10 per item.

• Fishing without a license— \$25 plus twice the cost of the license. For example, if a resident license is \$12, the fine would be \$25 plus \$24.

· Pollution, stream disturbances, boating under the influence, and reckless operation of a watercraft-\$250 to \$5,000 and/ or imprisonment not to exceed 90

· Repeat offender who is apprehended second time in a single year—the fine doubled.

• Fleeing or eluding an officer-\$100 fine.

· Giving false identification— \$50 fine.

• Homicide by watercraft—not less than \$2,500 nor more than \$10,000 and/or imprisonment not to exceed five years.




