Teachers needed for theater workshop

The Little Theatre of Wilkes-Barre is seeking teachers for its Summer Theatre Workshop to be held at the Little Theatre, 537 N. Main Street, Wilkes-Barre. Openings are available for experienced and enthusiastic people who can teach acting, stage craft, make-up, or costumes. There is also an opening for a director for the workshop's student production.

The workshop is geared toward students, grades 7 through 12,

who are interested in learning more about theatre. As well as classroom activities in basic acting and backstage techniques the students are expected to participate in a production for the general public.

Classes are scheduled for Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. to 12 noon, from June 20 through July 29, with a student production July 27 and 28. So the students receive a well-rounded theatrical

experience, different courses will be offered at least once a week but no more than three times a week. For teachers, this means it is not necessary to commit to a four-day week.
