The Crusaders were unable to move the ball against the Mounts and Dallas took over. Burd lost no time putting his team in front when he ran 44 yards to go into the end zone for the score. Chris Williams kicked the extra point and the Mountaineers led 14-7, enough to give them the game.

Burd was playing tailback position, the same position Tony Baldo played before he moved to West Virginia. Friday night he and Justin Reich were filling in for starter Dave Podehl, who was injured. The win moved Dallas to 4-0.


