Sen. Lemmond to head state reapportionment committee

Sen. Charles D. Lemmond (R- all voters are served in Washing-20) has been appointed by Senate President Pro Tempore Robert C. Jubelirer to serve a two-year term as chairman of the Senate State Government Committee.

As chairman of that committee, Sen. Lemmond will play a key role in the once-in-a-decade process of reapportionment—redrawing legislative districts to determine seats in Congress. All bills dealing with congressional reapportionment must pass through the State Government Committee before reaching the Senate for consideration.

"Because Pennsylvania's population decreased in the last census, the state will lose two seats in the U.S. Congress," Sen Lemmond said. "Therefore, a fair and representative reapportionment process will be crucial to ensuring that said.

The State Government Committee also reviews and takes action on all legislation involving state land and buildings and land trans-

Sen. Lemmond was also appointed to serve as vice chairman of the Senate Intergovernmental Affairs Committee, which deals with issues that cross the boundaries of state, federal and local gov-

His other Senate committee assignments include Finance, Judiciary, Local Government and Military and Veterans Affairs.

"Senate committees serve as the workshops for the legislative process, providing a forum for important ideas and input," Lemmond

New area water connection materials must be lead free

Water Company, Inc., Noxen Water Company, Inc., and Harveys Lake Water Company, Inc. are notifying area builders, plumbing contractors, and supply houses that these companies, in accordance with a new state law en-forced by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources and the United States Environmental Protection Agency, cannot allow new connections to public distribution systems unless plumbing materials have been certified as lead free. This new law, the Pennsylvania

Plumbing System Lead Ban and Notification Act, went into effect on January 6, 1991.

Lead has been recognized as a health risk. The new law is designed to protect public health and safety by prohibiting the sale of materials that contain lead and prohibiting their use in construction, modification and repair of plumbing systems.

Those customers residing in homes that may have lead materials as part of the plumbing system

The Dallas Water Company, Inc. and are concerned about lead levand its subsidiaries, Shavertown els may want to have their water tested for lead at a state certified laboratory capable of performing this analysis.

> Additionally, it is recommended that those residential facilities known to have lead materials within their plumbing may want to utilize the following precaution to minimize exposure. Any time water in a particular faucet has not been used for 6 hours or longer, flush the cold water pipes by running the water until it becomes as cold as it will get. Letting the water run an additional 15 seconds after it cools will also flush the service connector, which may be made of lead pipe. Flushing is not effective in large buildings such as offices or high rise apartments. Also use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and preparing baby formula or juices, as lead dissolves more easily in hot water than cold.
