IRS lists unclaimed refunds in names of local residents

federal tax refund checks that the Internal Revenue Service has not been able to deliver are being invited to step forward.

The IRS is continuing its annual search for owners of unclaimed federal tax refunds. The most common reason refund checks cannot be delivered is that the taxpayer moves after filing for his or her refund and does not give the IRS or the Post Office a forwarding address. Also, taxpayers who change their name for any reason should also notify the IRS.

The size of this year's unclaimed tax refunds in Eastern Pennsylvania ranges from \$1.00 to \$14,361. In an attempt to get unclaimed tax nock.

Refunds that cannot be returned to their owners are returned to the Treasury. Refunds must be claimed within three years of the due date for filing the refund tax return.


