## Dallas schools urge early registration

The Dallas School District is requesting the cooperation of parents with children of school age who have not registered for the 1991-92 school year.

It is essential that the district be informed, as soon as possible, of all new students planning to register, especially the kindergarten and first grade students.

Problems occur with class and school building assignments as

well as transportation arrangements when students are registered late. Parents of new students or those transferring from other schools are strongly encouraged to register their children immediately. Late Elementary registrants may not be assigned to the most convenient school building.

All kindergarten through fifth grade students are to register at the Administration Building,

Church Street, Dallas. Middle and Senior High students will register at the respective school offices located on Conynham Ave., Dallas.

Parents must bring birth certified, report cards from the previous school and immunization records. No student will be allowed to enter school without proof of the required immunizations.

## Outstanding Misericordia faculty honored

Professor Stanley S. Knapich, Ed.D., and Professor Louis Maganzin, Ph.D., faculty at College Misericordia, have been selected as winners of the 1990-91 Sears-Roebuck Foundation Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership Awards, announced Pasquale DiPasquale, Jr., Ph.D., Misericordia's president.

Knapich and Maganzin received their awards during Misericordia's Commencement exercises on Saturday, May 18. Knapich received the Excellence in Teaching in Professional Programs Award, while Maganzin earned the Excellence in Teaching Core Curriculum Award.

They are two of nearly 700 faculty members being recognized nationally by The Sears-Roebuck Foundation for resourcefulness and leadership as independent

college educators. They were selected by current Misericordia students and by last year's graduates.

The awards exemplify the high regard the students have for these professors, said DiPasquale, Jr.

"There is no one more deserving of these awards than Dr. Knapich and Dr. Maganzin," he said. "They are devoted to their students and give their lives to their work of education. The alumni who have studied with Dr. Knapich and Dr. Maganzin often comment on the impact these men have made on their lives."

Knapich, a professor of biology and director of the medical technology program, joined Misericordia in 1964. He has directed the medical technology program for more than 15 years and has served on the College's Faculty Senate, the Scholarship Committee and

the Middle States Steering Committee. He also was the initiator of the Drug and Alcohol Program on campus.

Maganzin, a professor of history, chair of the Scholarship Committee and past chair of the humanities division, has taught at Misericordia for nearly 30 years. He served as chair of the humanities division for two decades and established the College's Scholarship Committee for Graduate Awards and Grants. He also received Misericordia's Trustee Associates Award in 1988 in recognition of his work in maintaining the College's high academic standards.

The Sears-Roebuck Foundation Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership Award is administered nationally by the Stamford, Connecticut based-Foundation for Independent Higher Education.
