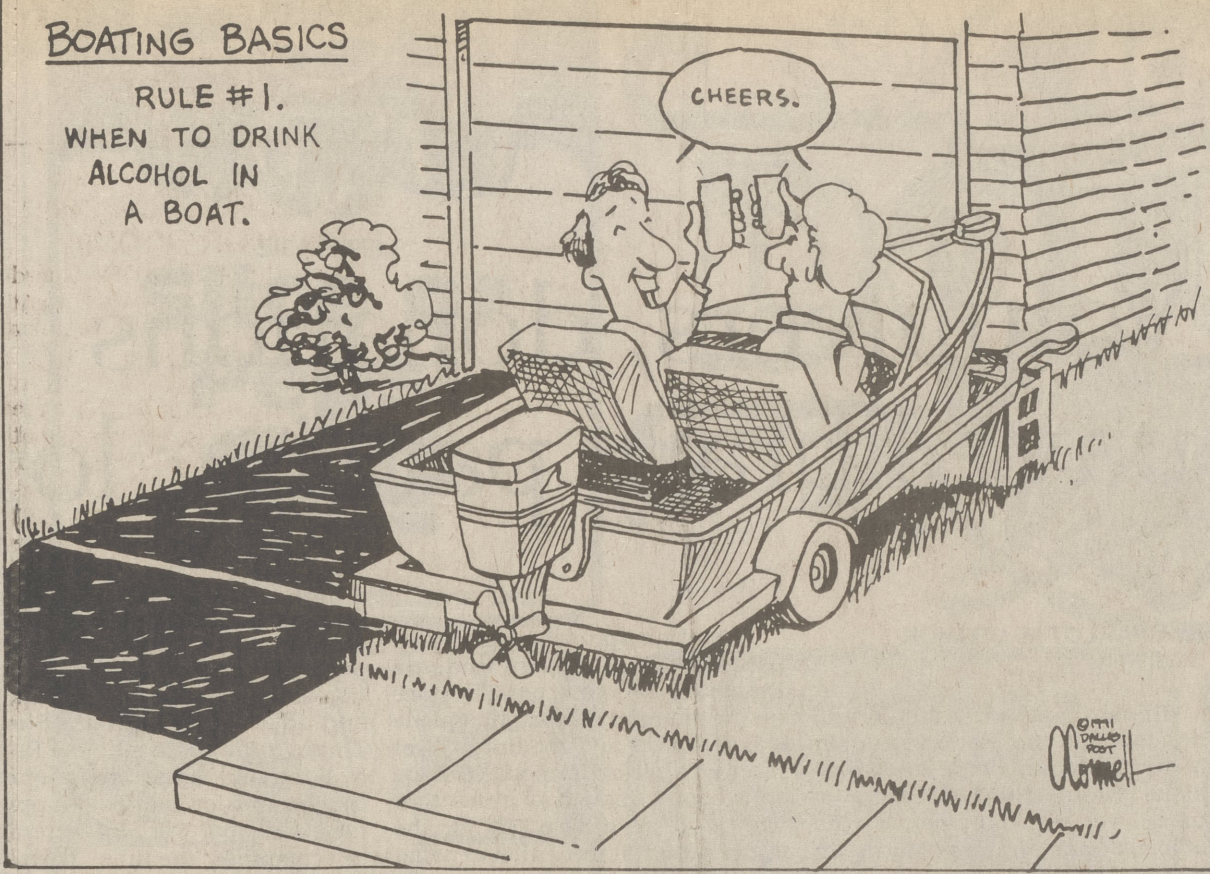

the township on Fridays and Saturdays and I found the majority participating. We have had some public complaints registered but no changes in the program have been made to date."

Box said considering the program is only in its fourth week, the participation rate has been excellent. He stated the office had many calls during the first week but most of them were questions about the schedule and the service.

During the past week or so some residents have united with residents from Dallas Borough and Dallas Township in protesting the \$135 per year collection fee. Some of the residents protest that they will be paying for two bags of garbage a week that they never have. Some of them have said they will refuse to give up the haulers they had previously to the new program and in some cases, the haulers refuse to give up their former customers.

According to the contract it will be up to the municipalities to enforce the contracted garbage fee as it is with non-payment of sewer charges. DAMA is the agent carrying out the mandate of the three municipalities.

New librarian is on the job at Back Mountain library

John Shaskas, DVM, chairman of the Back Mountain Library personnel committee announced recently that the library board had approved the appointment of Susan Rutstein Frey to fill the position of librarian at the library, effective July 16.

A native of Harding, Rutstein Frey graduated from Wyoming Area High School, attended Pennsylvania State University Wilkes-Barre Campus from 1984 to 1986, then received her B.A. degree in English, magna cum laude, in December, 1987.

She attended the University of Pittsburgh where she received a master's degree in library science in December, 1988.

While a student at Bloomsburg University she served as library assistant in the Andruss Library at the university, assisting in organizing and physically processing musical scores, processing monographic materials and searched and updated OCLC records for retrospective conversation.

She also created a serials database and implemented an automated serials control system and provided reference service for physicians and residents using print resources while serving as a paid academic intern at Blair Epincott Library, Eye and Ear Hospital in Pittsburgh.

She also served a paid academic internship at the Technical Information Center at Kennametal Inc., Erobe, PA, was a graduate student assistant at the University of Pittsburgh School of Library and Information Science, and in 1989 was employed as reference librarian at the Broome County Public Library in Binghamton, NY.

She received a graduate student assistantship at University of Pittsburgh, the Bakeless Academic Scholarship for English at Bloomsburg University and the Eic A. & Josephine Walker Award for student leadership from Pennsylvania State University.

She has served as past president of Circle K, Penn State; co-editor 'Les Mots Student' magazine at Penn State; member of Sigma Tau Delta, honorary fraternity, Bloomsburg University and past vice president of Specials Library Association University of Pittsburgh Student Chapter.

She came to the Back Mountain Library from College Misericordia where she had been assisting in the library.

"The staff is very pleasant and very efficient, which is half the battle," she said. "Each of the staff, both paid and volunteer, has a job to do and goes about it without any supervision."

"The public support from the community makes the work very exciting. There are so many people in and out all of the time. There are a lot of children using the library."

They come for books, for the story hour and for the children's contest. The heat has not cut back on the library visitors."

She and her husband, Tom, are parents of a daughter, Emily, seven weeks old.

"We are now residing in Wilkes-Barre, since Tom works in Scranton and I work in Dallas, each going a different direction. Wilkes-Barre is almost the halfway point for both of us. Tom gets on I-81 and gets to Scranton in good time and I get on the Cross Valley which gets me to the Back Mountain in a hurry."

Susan said she believes that her work with computers will be an asset when the library becomes automated in the future.

"At present I am busy learning the routine and where everything

is as well as trying to tie up loose ends," she said. "I have set some goals for the future but those will take time."

She is familiar with the Library Auction, attending since she was just a child. This year, she volunteered to work at the auction and both she and her husband worked at it.

Susan realizes that volunteers are scarce today because there are so many families where both parents work but she hopes to get some of the younger people involved as volunteers in the library.

"Many of these young people have some great ideas and can accept responsibility," she said. "If they serve only a few hours weekly, it will be a big help. We need a good mix of experienced volunteers and young adults with some new ideas."
