Dallas band places at Atlantic Coast meet

For the first time in five years, Dallas High School's marching band qualified to attend the Atlantic Coast Championships competition. Held the weekend of November 9-10 at the Lackawanna County Stadium, the competition featured 100 bands representing ten states. Dallas placed19th in the Group I overall competition,

and band director Todd Hunter explained that bands are grouped acording to their size within four different divisions, competing only against other bands in their group. In order to be eligible to attend Atlantic Coast Championships a band must first compete in the Atlantic Coast Chapter Championships. The top 25 units in each group are then invited to attend the Atlantic Coast Championship.
