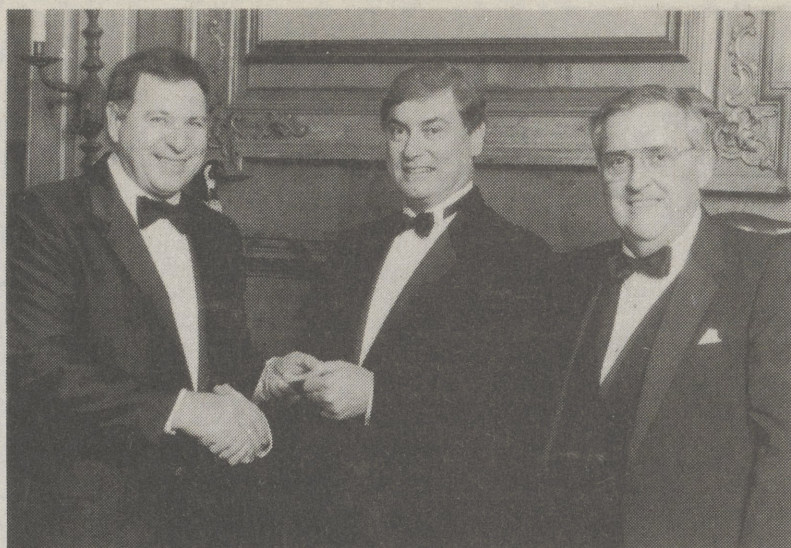
KNIGHTLIFE'S CHRISTMAS ISSUE

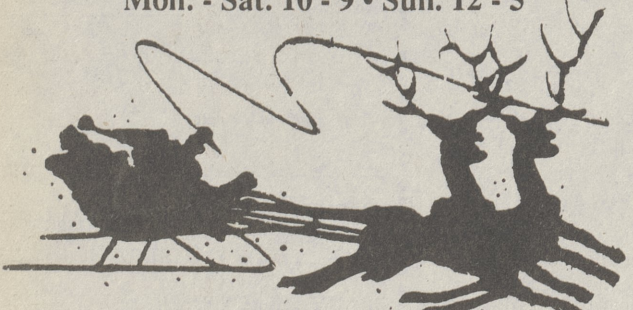
