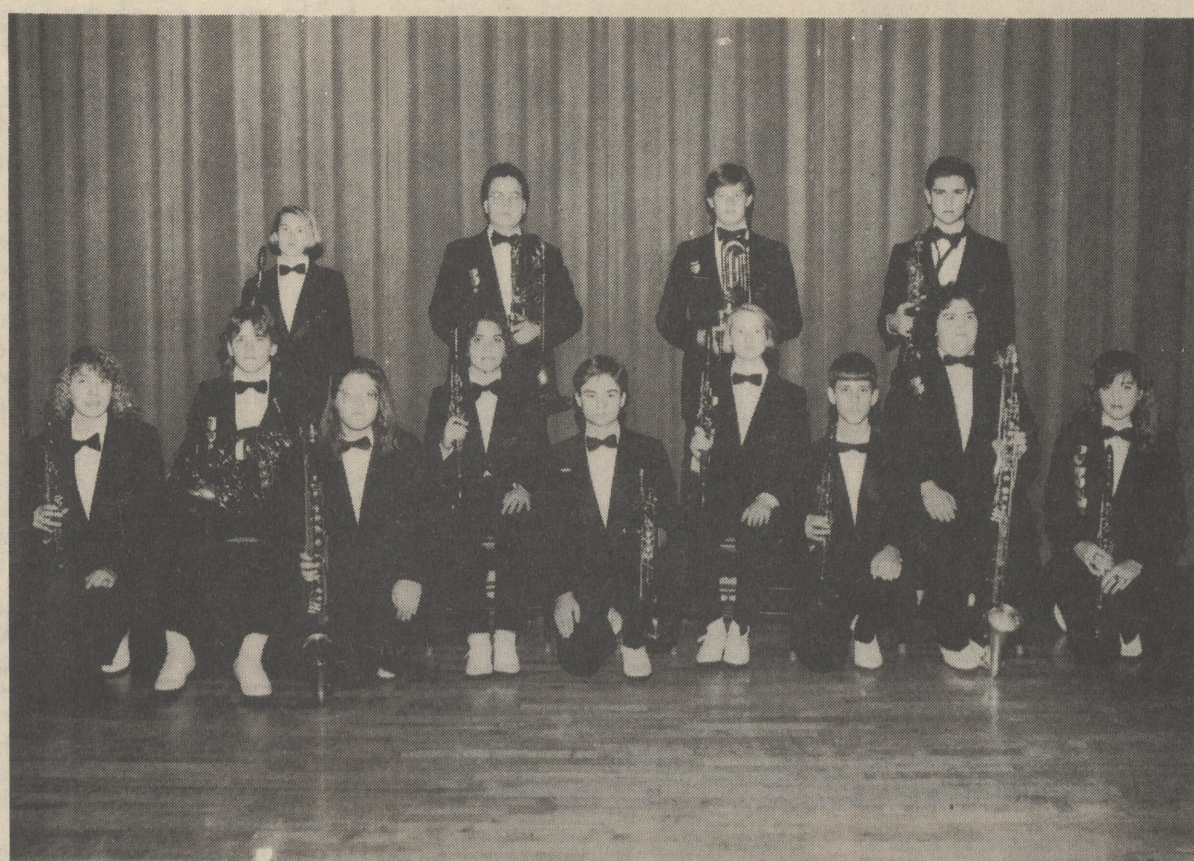

College Misericordia will offer a Chemistry Major

College Misericordia will increase its academic offerings this fall when the College begins recruiting students into its new chemistry major.

According to Dr. Mary Glennon, RSM, Misericordia academic dean, classes in chemistry will begin in the fall, 1993. Students completing the undergraduate level program will receive a bachelor of science degree in chemistry.

"This new program will strengthen the College's sciences curriculum and augment our bio-

logy major and our professional programs in the health sciences, as well as our pre-professional programs, such as pre-med," Dr. Glennon said. "There is a serious shortage of chemists in the workplace today, and this program will help address the need for well-trained scientific personnel."

To support the new program, Misericordia will upgrade its lab equipment and expects to hire two more faculty members. Dr. Hildegard Hof, one of two current chemistry faculty members, will serve as program director.
