Burd tops 3,000 yards in win over Crestwood

The Dallas High School football team has been a model of consistency during the first seven weeks of the football season. But last Saturday afternoon they

carried this thing a little too far. The Mountaineers have done a great job of stopping opposing opposing all season. But during Saturday's 14-0 win over Crestwood, they not only shut down the Comet offense, they stopped their own as well.
