PURPOSE:

To encourage the improvement of existing properties, rather than the development of new lands, these awards will be made for renovation or rehabilitation projects, (or small additions to existing buildings), including landscaping and other site improvements. New construction will not be considered.

QUALIFICATIONS:

1. A residential exterior restoration, a renovation project, or a site improvement located in any of of the nine member municipalities of the Back Mountain: Dallas and Harveys Lake Boroughs; Dallas, Franklin, Jackson, Kingston, Lake, Lehman and Ross Townships.

2. Projects must have been completed within the past 5 years.

3. Submission of before and after photographs is desirable.

4. New addition projects will be considered if the area of the addition is less than 25% of the existing building, and the original structure has been renovated.

JUDGING:

A panel of judges chosen by the Back Mountain Citizens Council will select the winners. Site visits.

The Back Mountain Citizens photographs, and literature will be used to select winners. The BMCC and its judges reserve the right to withhold awards when aesthetic standards are not met.

AWARDS

Commendations for the year will be published in a special Spring Home Improvement section of the Dallas Post, with articles giving photographic and written descriptions of the projects selected.
