Students at King's College chosen for spring interships

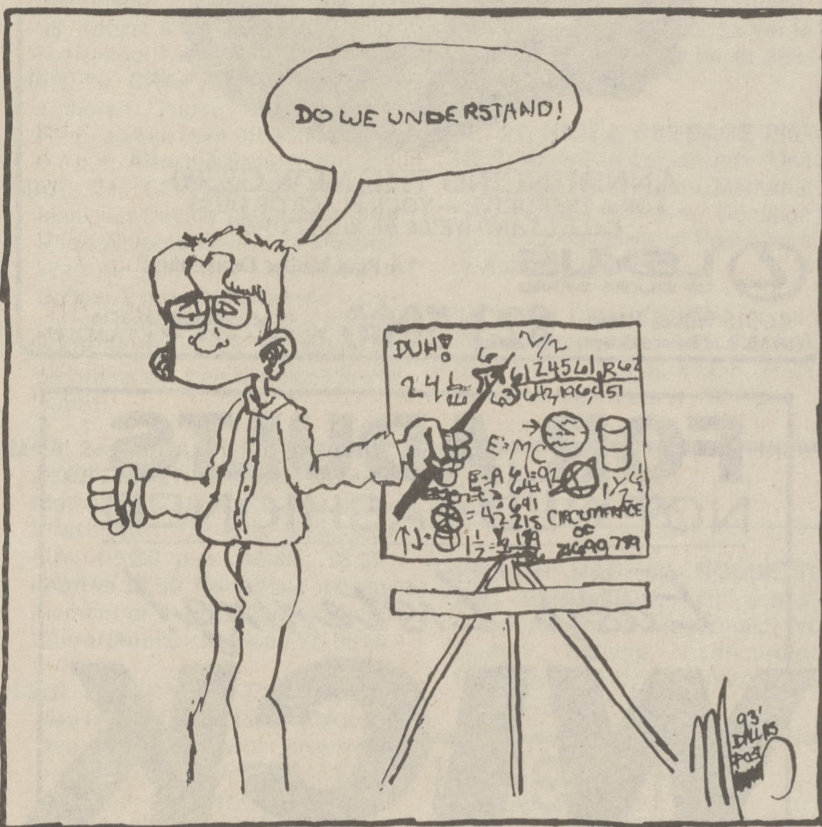
Three local senior King's College human resources management majors are currently conducting internships at The Borg Warner Corporation, a large company specializing in automotive components and protective security services in Chicago. They are the first students from outside the Chicago area to ever receive the full-semester, paid internships.

The three students, Jill Coniglio, Swyersville; Heather Hoyes, Dallas and Kelly Terescavage, Trucksville, are interning at the Borg Warner's Bellwood Automotive plant outside Chicago. Following an orientation, the three interns are now assisting the company's organizational development specialist, Valerie Larson, in developing self-managed work teams among the employees, delivering team building and interpersonal skills training to engineering and factory floor workers, and developing technical training programs. In addition, the interns are interviewing key personnel at Borg Warner to learn how the various components of the organization work together to strategically maintain a competitive advantage.

Dr. Angela D'Versa, a member of the human resource department at Borg Warner's corporate headquarters, visited King's in January to interview and select the interns.

Last year The Borg Warner Foundation and John O'Brien, a member of King's class of 1964 and vice president and managing partner at Borg Warner, established a human resources management scholarship to assist needy and deserving students from Wyoming Valley with a gift of \$150,000. Coniglio, Hoyes, and Terescavage were the first recipients of this Bernard F. O'Brien Scholarship, which honors John O'Brien's father, who served as a Pennsylvania state representative for 18 years.

"King's is pleased about this outstanding opportunity for our human resources management students. This internship is a top-notch experience for our students. We are grateful to Borg Warner for providing such a high quality program, and congratulate these three seniors for developing skills that enable them to participate in this internship," said Dr. Jean O'Brien, director of the human resources management program at King's.

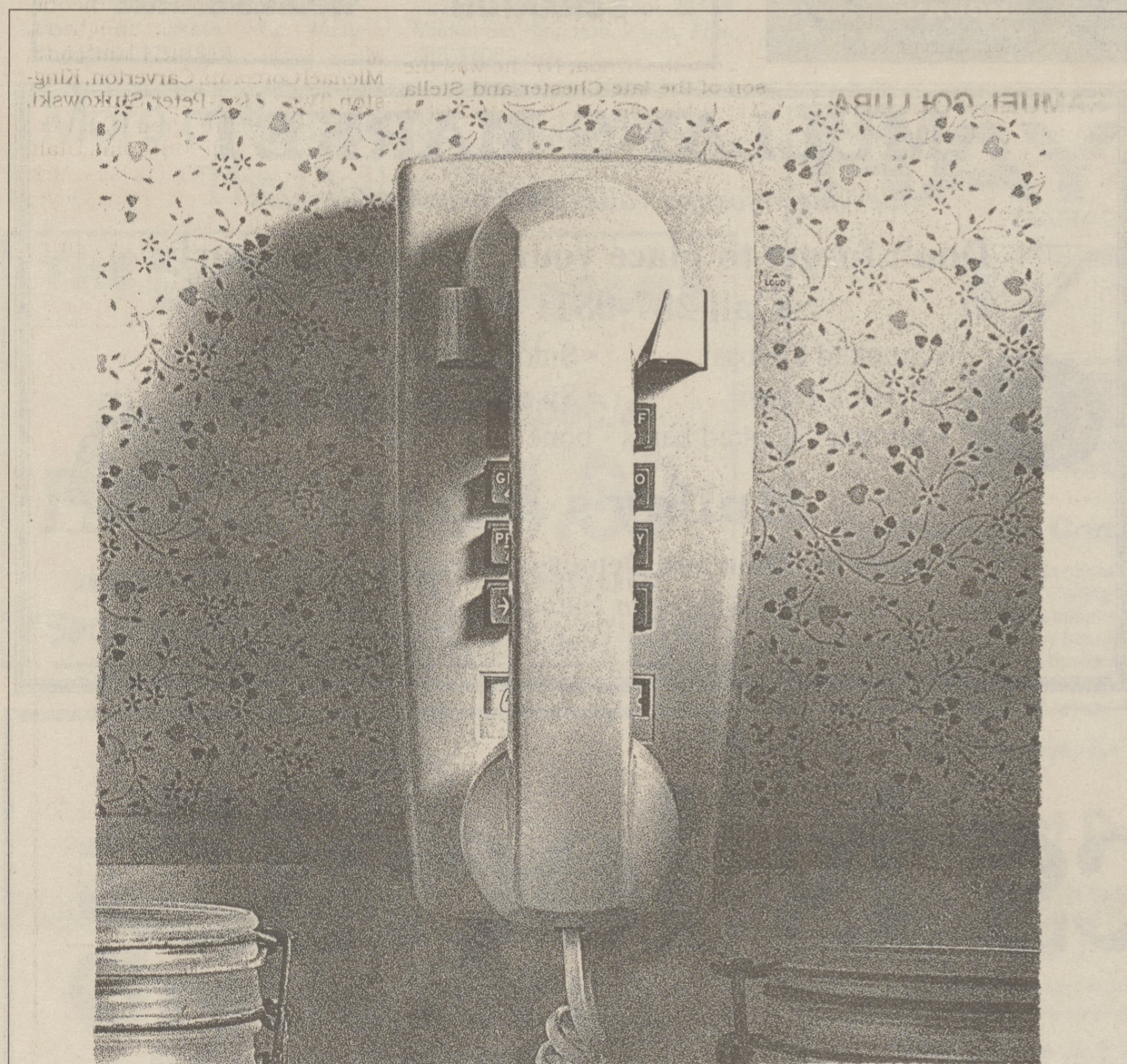


Special science assembly
