This fully equipped bag was purchased and will be marked "In Memory of Michael Blaine" (the three year old son of the fire company chief and treasurer Joe and Sandy Blaine). He was the victim of a fatal ice water drowning accident on December 16, 1991.

The members have planned a Fishermen's Breakfast at their hall for the first day of Trout Season from 4 to 10 a.m.

They also have plans for a Summer Kickoff Dinner Dance in May. All proceeds from the Dinner Dance go to pay for the installation of a fire/burglar alarm system in the building.
