'Libraries Change Lives' is week's theme

National Library Week will be celebrated in 1993 from April 18-24. The national theme is "Libraries Change Lives" with a sub theme of "Look Listen Learn". The theme for the essay contest conducted by the Luzerne County Library System was "Speak Out for America's Libraries". Each library is judging their individual contests and then the decision will be made on the county level.

Three entries nationwide will be chosen to receive a trip for two to the 1993 ALA Conference where they will be honored at the opening general session.

Some things happened to "Shape Lives" through library use: A 21 year old Air Force Academy cadet selected as one of *Time Magazine's* top 20 students in 1990 says, "It started in the eighth grade when the school librarian kind of coerced me into writing to NASA to find out how to become an astronaut". A 10-year-old school

girl became 'hooked' on Nancy Drew at the Aspen, Colo. Public Library.

Having observed her coming once and sometimes twice a day throughout the summer, the librarian guided her to a shelf of biographies about women. Looking back on the revelation, award-winning journalist Nina Totenberg recalls, "You could actually read about famous women—you didn't have to read only about men...I owe a lot to libraries." Your library has made books on all subjects to change your life.

Some new large print books at the library: "The Client" by John Grisham is an irresistible novel, so thoroughly entertaining and satisfying, it is sure to please his millions of fans and to win him new ones as well. It is the story of 11 year old Mark Sway, who witnesses the bizarre suicide of a New Orleans attorney. Just before he dies, the lawyer tells Mark a deadly secret concerning the recent murder of a Louisiana Senator, whose accused killer is

about to go on trial.

"Colony" by Anne Rivers Siddons is the story of Maude Chambliss, 90-year-old doyenne of Retreat, an exclusive summer colony in Maine, who is waiting for her granddaughter to arrive and take her home at the close of the season.

As she waits, she reminisces on a rich lifestyle that began on the day she arrived at Retreat as a young bride, clearly out of place in this enclave of aristocratic Bostonians, through all the summers she spent there and the love and tragedy, happiness and sorrow, friendship and enmity she experienced.

"Whispers" by Belva Plain is a realistic portrait of a marriage in recent fiction. In it we are privy to the secret life of one outwardly perfect family, hear the whispers about what goes on behind their closed doors, and experience the triumph when one person dares to tell the truth. Family secrets are about to explode in an unforgettable climax.

The event will be held Thursday, May 6 beginning at 7:30 p.m.

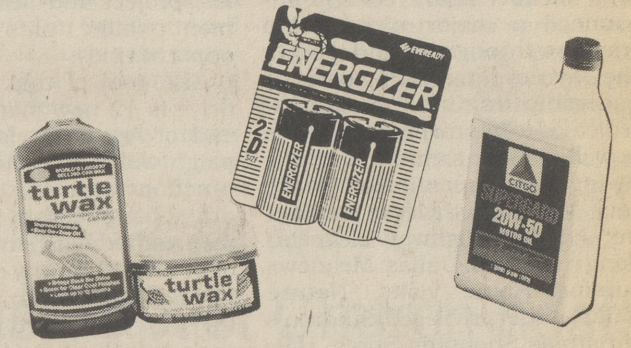
