• Gouple will give view of Europe war

Croatia and Bosnia-Hercegovina, two republics carved from the former nation of Yugoslavia, are studies in contrasts: while pilgrims flock to the little Bosnian town of Medjugorje, where the Virgin Mary is reported to have appeared, nearby villages in both countries are being torn apart by

Back Mountain residents will have the opportunity to learn firsthand of the "ethnic cleansing" and other horrors suffered by the citizens of Croatia and Bosnia-Hercegovina Tuesday, May 11, in a special program presented by native Croatians Helen and Joseph Sarcevic at Shavetown United Methodist Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Sarcevic, who say they have both lost relatives and friends to Serbian aggression, regularly travel to their homeland, leading pilgramages to Medjugorje and stopping along the way to render humanitarian aid to people living in refugee centers.

"Everyone who isn't Serbian is in danger," Mrs. Sarcevic said. "We have seen churches, hospitals, schools, roads, bridges - all reduced to rubble. The Serbians wipe out the entire civilization in an area, occupy it and rebuild it their own way.

The Croatians are mostly Catholic, with some Moslems, while the Serbians, once Orthodox Christians, are now non-believers due to decades of Communist rule, she said.

"The people are really struggling, reduced to subsistence living. They try to grow their own food, but must rely mainly on outside help," Mrs. Sarcevic continued.

Considered by the Communists to be intellectuals and therefore threats to the government, the Sarcevics fled their country in 1957, staying in a refugee camp in Italy for two years until they were allowed to emigrate to the United States.

The process euphemistically called "ethnic cleansing" was going on while the Communists ruled Yugoslavia, but the government presented a false picture to the world, Mrs. Sarcevic said.

Only after referendums in 1990 resulted in the republics of Croatia, Bosnia-Hercegovina, Slovenia, Vojvodia, Montenegro and Macedonia splitting from Yugoslavia, did the efforts of the Serb-led Yugoslav army's offensives against Moslem and Croatian villages become publicized, according to pamphlets distributed

by the Croatian Information Center of America in Eastlake, Ohio.

"We did not have a voice to speak for us then. I think that it means a lot to the ones in the refugee camps to know that somebody cares. I will be their voice, and share their need for help with any group who will listen," Mrs. Sarcevic said.

After the program, Mr. and Mrs.

Sarcevic will be available during a social hour in the church's fellow ship hall to answer questions and accept free-will donations for the Croatian Franciscan Emergency Relief Fund.

Sponsored by the United Methodist Women and the Outreach Committee of the Shavertown United Methodist Church, the program will begin at 7:30 p.m.


