*On Your Own: Independence for Ages 18-100* which was the subject of her program.

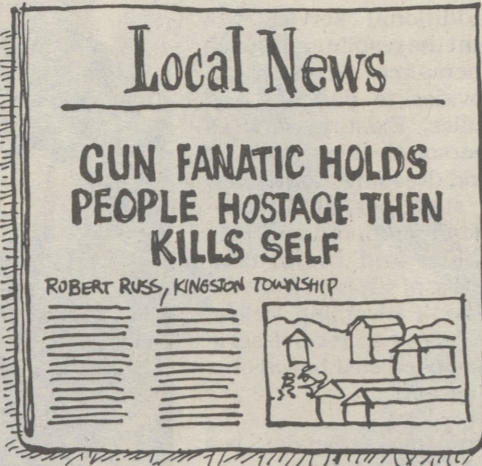

New books at the library: "Gai-Jin" by James Clavell is grand in scope and scale filled with the richness and passion of two great histories coming together, in the 6th novel of the Asian Saga. It is an extraordinary tale of Japan,

now newly open to gai-jin—for- eigners—and teeming with contradictions as the ancient and the modern meet in a clash of cultures, of nations, of generations. A collision of two equally powerful cultures.

"I'll Be Seeing You" by Mary Higgins Clark tells a spellbinding tale of murder and duplicity, of hidden lives and medical secrets. A television news reporter is covering a story in the emergency room of a large metropolitan hospital when a young woman is rushed in on a stretcher, victim of a stabbing. Secrets are exposed of people close to her.

"We'll Meet Again" by Philippa Carr is a moving story of undying love, from the Cornwall saga. When Violetta Denver last saw her fiancé, Jowan Jermyn, he and his regiment were off to defend a weakening Europe from the tyranny of Adolf Hitler. Months pass, then years, and he is presumed missing in action. A historical, powerful and romantic novel.

### LEHMAN MAY DAY TO FOCUS ON HISTORY

American History from the first Pilgrims' landing right up to the present, will be the theme of the Lehman May Day to be held on the school grounds. Following the Grand March and traditional May Pole Dance, various periods in the history of the U.S. will be portrayed by the students.

The Scrap Salvage Committee in Dallas Township is well on its way achieving a goal of 50,000 tons, but still needs the whole-hearted cooperation of every citizen in the township if it is to make that goal by June 1.

Starting within a week or two, women of Dallas area will be able to make surgical dressing for Wyoming Valley Red Cross at Irem Country Club instead of going to

the Wilkes-Barre Chapter House. This will be the first sub-station established by the Red Cross and extent transportation difficulties.

According to John Roberts, president of Lehman Township Volunteer Fire Co., Lester B. Squier, principal of Lehman-Jackson Joint Schools will head the ninth annual Back Mountain Horse Show, July 4 to be held on the Lehman-Jackson High School grounds.

Hearings on an increase in rates for Back Mountain patrons of Commonwealth Telephone Co. discontinued March 10 are in full swing again at Luzerne County Court House. Increase of \$1-\$2 per month were announced as taking effect January 11, 1953. Due to protests of consumers, Public Utility hearings were inaugurated.

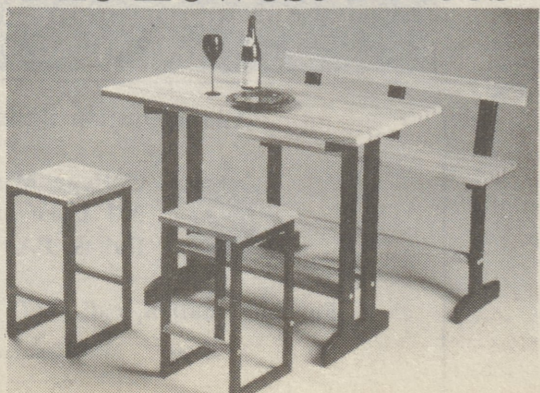
