Thompson graduates from PCCM Medical College

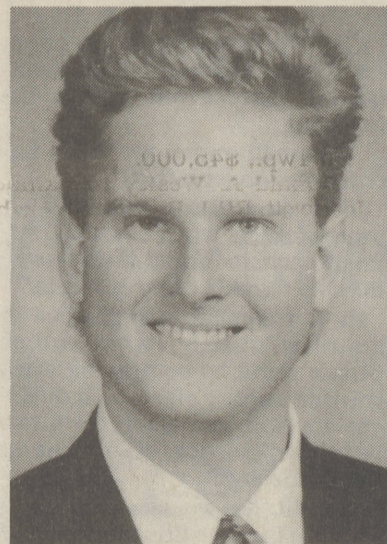

Dr. Thompson will be starting an OB/GYN tracking program which enables him to enter his specialty sooner and finish his residency one year earlier.

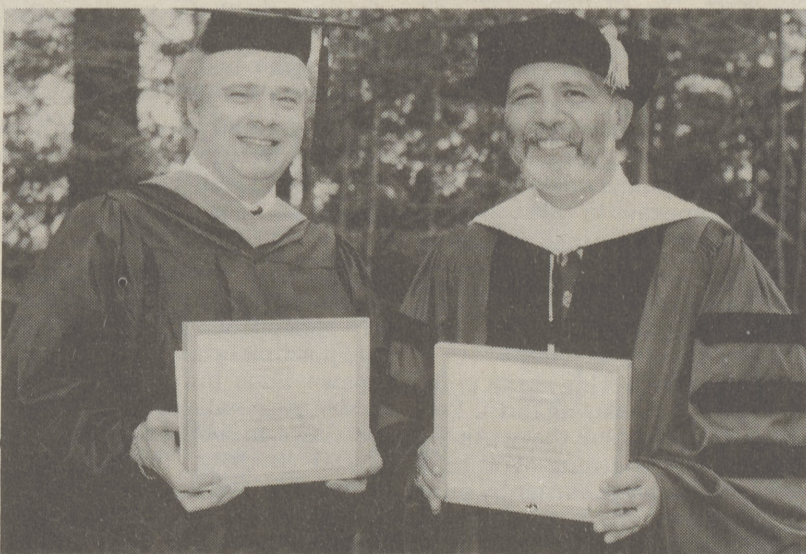
Dr. Thompson graduated magna cum laude from Wilkes College and from Dallas Area High School.

Next round of work on 309 set for August

Drivers on Route 309 in Kingston Township have only six weeks until road construction changes the highway's traffic patterns.

According to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's (Penn-DOT) highway safety liaison coordinator Faith Ann Liuzzo-Giordano, construction to widen the 1.2-mile stretch of highway between Harris Hill Road and Center Street to five lanes is expected to begin in late August, finishing up in June, 1994.

The apparent low bidder, American Asphalt, bid \$1,394,458.71 on this phase of the highway improvement project.

Work will begin once the state approves the bid, Liuzzo-Giordano said.

This is the first phase of a \$3 million federally-funded highway corridor safety project for the Back Mountain, expected to be finished in two years.

The second phase, slated to begin this fall and be completed within a year, will see the installation of new traffic lights at the Route 309 intersections at Franklin Street and at Main Street near Offset Paperback, and the Route 415 intersections with West Center Hill Road near Pickett's Charge Restaurant and with Route 118.

Traffic lights at Dallas Corners and the Route 309/Center Hill/Hildebrandt intersections will be upgraded, while Irem Road opposite the Country Club Shopping Center will be closed.

The third phase, planned to last from mid-1994 to mid-1995, will involve the upgrading of the Route 309 intersections at Hillside Road, where a traffic light, jughandle and turning lanes will be added, and at Carverton Road, where the traffic light will be upgraded and right-turn lanes from Route 309 northbound and Carverton Road westbound will be added.
