Wilkes biology students awarded research grants

Two Wilkes University biology students were recently awarded research grants from Sigma Xi, the National Research Society for Scientists, to support their research projects at the University.

Christine Geist of Wilkes-Barre is conducting research on the effects of small mammals on the dispersal of acorns at several field sites located in Dorrance and Moon Lake Park.

Joyce Hazeltine of Dallas, a graduate student in Biology Education, has worked for two years on the storing behavior of gray squirrels in Kirby Park. Her study is designed to examine the animal's behavior responses to various acorn and oak characteristics and the resulting influence of such decisions on the dispersal of the seeds.


Both studies attempt to demonstrate how animals help forest trees to colonize new areas. The students' research advisor, Dr. Michael Steele said, "With the loss of many oak trees in Eastern United States to the Gypsy Moth outbreak, the research projects that Joyce and Christine have conducted will have valuable
