DAMA changes trash billing procedure

DAMA has changed the quarterly billing cycle of the Trash and Recycling Bills since the current contract ends December 31, 1993. The bills will now be mailed on a calendar year basis with the billing cycle the same as the sewer bills.

The current charge of \$33.75 is for the third quarter which covers July, August, and September. In October the fourth quarter bill for \$33.75 which covers October, November and December will be mailed.

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
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"What a wonderful group!" said auction advisor Pauline Kutz. "They're fantastic! When we asked for their help, they said without hesitation that they would be here."
