

Racy bar ad draws complaint

The Harveys Lake Borough council heard complaints from residents about two bars located in the complex housing the Bud Light Amphitheater at its July 20 meeting.

Waving copies of two recent advertisements in a local daily newspaper from Chicky's Sports Bar and Coop, Sandra Serhan Perez asked the council, "What are we doing to ourselves and our community?"

Advertising Friday night entertainment, the July 14 ad read, "It's a co-ed bash! Topless bartender night. Join your friends and get naked! Drink special: Sex on the Lake."

The July 21 ad simply promoted Friday night as topless bartender night.

Mayor Joseph Boyle responded, "It's a misleading ad. There were no topless bartenders."

Environmental Advisory Committee member Guy Giordano announced that his committee needs more members. Of the seven people on the committee, only three are active, Giordano said.

"We need help. We have 20 percent of the members doing 80 percent of the work," said com-

mittee chairman David Abod. Councilman Richard Boice said that five or six volunteers from the municipal authority would bring a backhoe and containers to help the EVAC with its large appliance cleanup day.

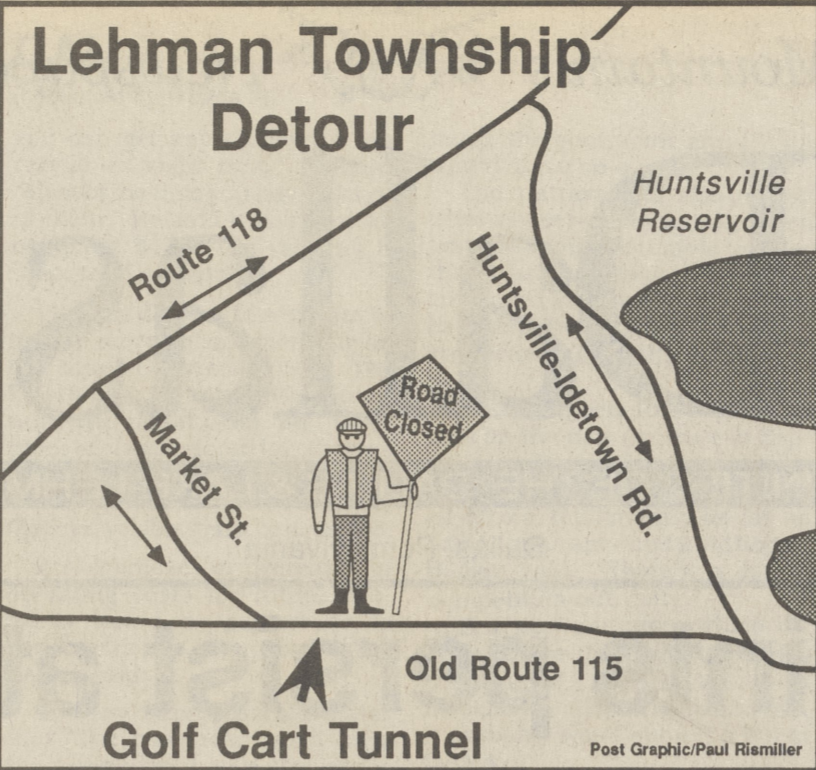
In other business, the council voted to:

- Retain Attorney Ralph Kates to represent the borough in possible pending litigation in federal court. Council members and borough solicitor Charles McCormack refused further comment on the case.

- Adopted an ordinance allowing the D.C. Roberts Fire Company to provide fire protection and emergency services to the borough, with councilmen William Wilson and Edward Kelly abstaining. Council explained that the ordinance is necessary for liability insurance and workmen's compensation purposes.

- Advertise the borough's 1984 GMC dump truck, without plow equipment, for sale as is.

- Contact Armand Mascioli concerning the 4,000-gallon gasoline tank at the new boat fuel station at the marina. Richard Heuer of Old Lake Road reported that he is concerned because there are no "No Smoking" signs posted around the tank.



Tunnel construction will close road August 9-13

Construction of a golf cart tunnel for the new Huntsville Golf Club will close part of Old Route 115 south of the Market Street intersection in Lehman Township for the first week in August.

George R. Evans of Killam Associates, the golf club's engineer, said that Old Route 115 will be closed between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., for a week while a golf cart tunnel is installed underneath the roadway.

While the road is closed, motorists who normally drive on Old Route 115 will follow a detour along the Huntsville-Idetown Road, Route 118 and Market Street, Evans said.

Old Route 115 will be open to one lane of traffic, directed by a flagperson, between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. during this time.

Vandals, thieves hit Dallas elementary, middle schools

Dallas Township police are investigating two incidents of vandalism at Dallas public schools, which were reported July 13.

According to police chief Carl Miers, three Tandy computers, three computer monitors and three computer keyboards, with a total value of \$4,350, were removed from the Dallas Elementary School sometime between the evening of July 12 and the morning of July 13.

Although police didn't find any signs of forced entry into the building, Miers said that a door on the school's southeast side was found

locked but not closed all the way.

Personnel working in the building had checked all doors and windows before they left work July 12, Miers said.

In a second incident, two windows at the Dallas Middle School were reported broken Tuesday, July 13.

Miers said that a can of soda was thrown through a window on the building's east side, while a rock was thrown against a window on the school's west side.

No damage estimates are available, Miers said.

Police request that anyone with any information on the two incidents call the Dallas Township police at 675-5251.
