New books at the library: "Virgin of the Rodeo" by Sarah Bird is a novel about Sonja K. Getz, big hips, bigger brain, monster mouth—on her tour of the West that Was Suppressed. In Dorfburg, Texas, you can't get much farther out than a jumbosized, rabidly P.C. woman who won't shut up and doesn't give a warm cowpie whether you like it or not. Vowing to show all the hometown clods—Sonja embarks upon a quest to find the father she knows only from a worn photo of a Native American trick roper. All true Western heroes are not outsiders.

"The Wrong Man" by David E. Fisher is the story of Walter Naman, German-born Jew, naturalized American citizen and profesisonal Nazi-hunter who is intent on assassinating Gottfried Waldner, the German chancellor, who is about to visit the United States and is supposedly plotting to resurrect the Third Reich. David Melnik, a Mossad agent is dispatched to meet with the U.S. authorities to prevent the assassination and quickly becomes inextricably involved in the case. The manhunt keeps the reader on the edge of his chair.

"Dark Star" by Alan Furst takes place in Paris, Moscow, Berlin and Prague.


