The bride was feted at a bridal shower given by her mother and sister at the Bear Creek Inn, Bear Creek.

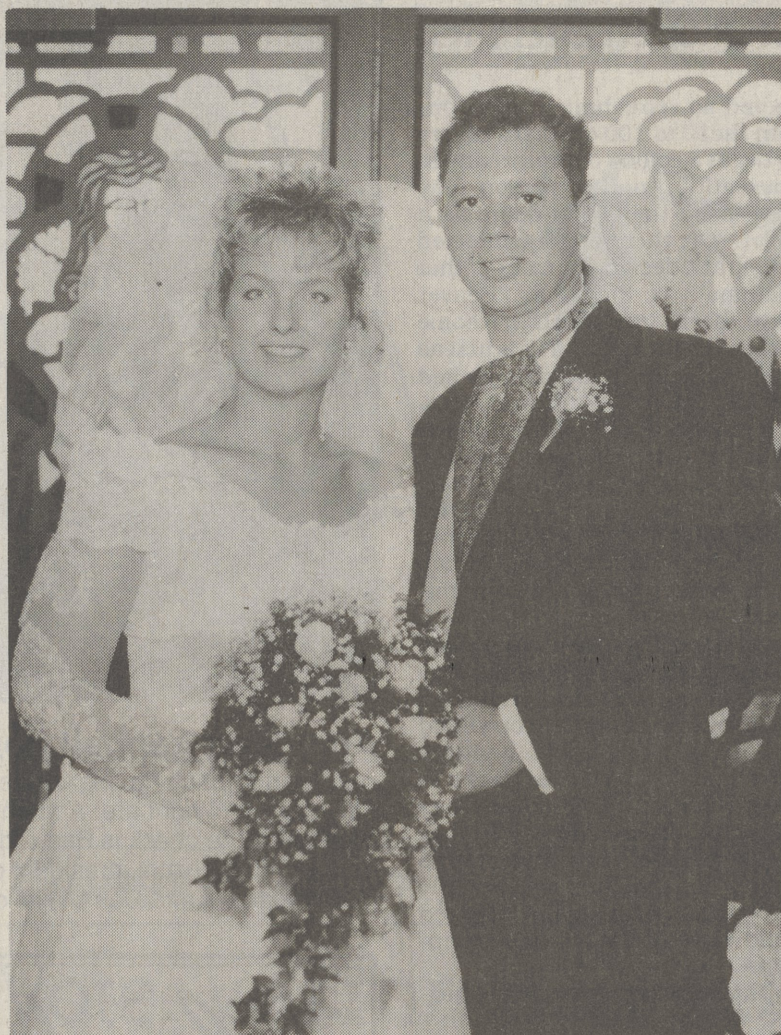
A rehearsal dinner was hosted by the parents of the groom at the Castle Inn, Dallas.

Penn State to host UFO lecture, slide show Oct. 27

You may not have heard as much lately about aliens from Outer Space—after all, *Star Trek* is now mainstream. But the interest is still strong, and perhaps growing, in UFOs (unidentified flying objects). The public is invited to a lecture and slide show at the Wilkes-Barre Campus of Penn State in Lehman on Wednesday, Oct. 27, at 7:30 p.m. in Hayfield House.

The lecturer is Antonio Huneus, a Chilean-American journalist, who is consulting editor and UFO columnist for *Fate* magazine, as well as the international coordinator for the Mutual UFO Network (MUFON), the world's largest ufological research organization.

In his talk, which is described as a "UFO Chronicle," Huneus will discuss abductions and close encounters of the third kind, UFOs in history, and IFOs (identified flying objects). He will also give a global update on UFOs in Russia and the former republics of the USSR, China, Japan, Europe and South America. His slide show includes authentic photographs, illustrations and artists' renditions of classic and recent UFO incidents, map, charts, pictures of witnesses, landing sites, investigators and historical characters, and NASA space photographs.
