## Dallas Honor Roll ceremonies note 75th Armistice Day

Veterans and Dallas Borough officials gathered November 11 at the Honor Roll at Dallas Corners to commemmorate the 75th anniversary of the armistice ending World War I. It was the 50th such eeremony at the site.

First dedicated November 21, 1943, the Honor Roll, located on a small triangular plot of grass at Lake Street, Route 415 and Memorial Lane, has had many facelifts during the past 50 years.

The monument's most recent addition is a bronze plaque attached to its back side, replacing a ceramic plaque which had become weather-worn and cracked. The new bronze plaque has been donated by Chapel Lawn Ceme-

"There aren't any names on the Honor Roll," said Daddow-Isaacs American Legion Post 672 Adjutant Thomas E. Reese. "It honors veterans of all wars."

The original Honor Roll had the names of 128 Dallas Borough men and women serving in World War II etched into its Carra glass surface. Topped by a bronze stylized eagle, it also honored the memory of all borough veterans of all wars.

The unveiling ceremony in 1943 had been carried to all parts of the borough by a special amplifying system, according to an article in the November 26, 1943 issue of The Dallas Post, with then-editor, Howard Risley, serving as master of ceremonies.

Sometime later the Honor Roll was covered with ceramic tile, then with stonework done by local stonemason Jake Andreas, Reese

Funeral director Richard Disque had paid for the stonework and the bronze front plaque, Reese


