Dallas Twp. budget grows by 22%, but no tax hike planned

Dallas Township's preliminary 1994 budget will hold the line on the six-mill property tax and shows little change from last year.

The \$1,447,500 budget, an increase of \$321,500 over last year, reflects a five percent increase of \$30,000 in the earned income tax, with real estate taxes remaining at \$115,000.

The township expects to begin 1994 in the black, with \$320,000 on hand.

Road work-related expenses account for the largest spending increase. The township plans to spend 31 percent or \$208,800 more, on road work totaling \$665,000.

The preliminary budget is posted for public inspection at the township building.
