They've knocked on the door many times before. But this time, someone answered. The Washington High School

football team has come close to making the state playoffs before, but bad luck or bad timing has stood in the way of winning the title.

This season, they were determined not to let that happen again. The number two-ranked Class AA team in the state, according to the Harrisburg Patriot News Poll, will face number one Dallas on Friday night at 6 p.m. at Mansion Park in Altoona for the Pennsylvania Class AA state championships.

"We had three goals before the season began," said Washington head coach Guy Montecalvo. If that name sounds familiar to avid Penn State fans, it should. Montecalvo was a defensive back for the Nittany Lions from 1973-1977. 'One of those goals was to win the state championship. We've been close the last two years. We've been knocking on the door."

In 1990 the Little Prexies, a member of the Three Rivers Conference in District 7, lost 21-20 in the final minutes to conference rival Canevin Catholic. Canevin advanced to the state final where they lost to Hanover Area in overtime.

Last year, Washington was eliminated in their conference final on a controversial touchdown pass with 10 seconds remaining in the game. According to Montecalvo, game film clearly showed the receiver out of bounds on the winning reception.

The Little Prexies wanted to take matters into their own hands

Sto-Rox, a perennial Class AA power in D-7, finished this season with a record of 1-9. Washington advanced to the state final with a 12-7 win over a strong Riverside (near Pittsburgh) team in the District 7 final and a 21-0 blanking of Forest Hills in the western final. They've done it with strength and speed. The Little Prexies are

anything but what their nickname may suggest. Washington's offensive line averages 233 pounds while their defensive line averages 240 poounds per player. But Dallas can match size with their western opponent. Dallas's four defensive linemen average 221 pounds per man while their offensive line averages 225 pounds per man with junior tackle Marty Straigis in the lineup.

Washington has some fine skill people led by senior tailback Steve Pirris. Pirris has rushed for 1,360 yards on 181 carries (7.5 avg.) even though he missed three games due to an injury. Aaron Gatten (109-593) and fullback Joseph Evans (82-505) each have rushed for at least 500 yards this year.

Senior quarterback Mike Bonus has completed 92-of-179 (51 percent) passes this season for ,189 yards and 15 touchdowns. Tight end Brian Pelkey has caught 20 passes for 278 yards and seven touchdowns this season, while

split ends Andy Molinaro (22-243) and Chris Dimmack (20-295) round out a balanced receiving corps

Defensive end and offensive tackle Jamaal Edwards verbally committed to Penn State early in the season and Pirris (Kent State, Ohio University), Bonus (William & Mary, Colgate), guard Rahmaire Brooks, (North Carolina, Virginia, Bowling Green) and tackle Jonathan Miles (UVA, Ohio State, Indiana) all have colleges seeking their services after high school.

Although his team has aver-aged nearly 305 yards per game this season, Montecalvo knows his team faces a stern test this Friday night.

"We've told the kids that this will be the best defensive team we've faced all year," said the 14- 0 year head coach. "Dallas plays the 4-4 defense as well as any high school football team I've seen in quite a while. I was very, very impressed with the way their two down linemen (Greg Nazdan and Marty Straigis) anchored the line, the speed of their defensive ends (Steve Button and Ed Mattie) and the hitting of their linebackers and defensive backs. I think Dallas has a great defensive football team."

Like the Mountaineers, Montecalvo and the Little Prexies would like to take advantage of the opportunity at hand.

"We've come up short so many times. We may never get this opportunity again," said Montecalvo. "This is a once-in-a-life-time opportunity for most of the kids. But in order to accomplish our goal, we'll have to beat Dallas. And they'll be the best team we've faced all season."

Stacey's trip to San Antonio was made possible by the generous donations from the community, said her father, David Suda.
