# Lake-Lehman taxpayer group recommends contract cutbacks

The Lake-Lehman Taxpayers' Association has presented a letter to superintendent of schools Nancy Davis outlining its recommendations for the next contract between the school district and the teachers. Negotiations on the pact, which will take effect with the 1994-95 school year, are just beginning.

The group asks for the following:

• A 10 percent reduction in all teacher salaries.

• Reduction in health benefits, by raising the annual deductible to \$250 and requiring a 20 percent co-payment for all medical expenses. Also, eliminating completely the dental benefits, and lowering to age 19 the coverage for dependents.

• Eliminate entirely the present six days of personal, emergency and bereavement leave.

• Reduce reimbursement for courses taken by teachers to 50 percent from the present 100 percent.

· Eliminate automatic salary increases based on a teacher earning additional course credit.

• Eliminate paid leave to union representatives to attend conferences and conventions.

• Require the union to share the cost of printing the contract agreement.

• Eliminate advance payment of salaries for the summer months, which now may be paid entirely in June.

• End the practice of allowing children of Lake-Lehman teachers who live outside the district attending district schools tuition free.

# Watch out for holiday hazards

A child plucks an ornament off the Christmas tree and bites into it...melted candle wax burns an innocent victim...leftover party foods and alcohol make a tempting meal for an early-rising child.

But incidents like these can be avoided if you follow these tips from the Central Pennsylvania Poison Control Center, located at Penn State's University Hospital of The Milton S. Hershey Medical Center.

Holiday plans may brighten your surroundings, and many are safe, but a few are extremely hazardous. The poinsettia, in spite of its reputation, is not a highly poisonous plant. If ingested, it may cause some irritation to the mouth or stomach discomfort.

But mistletoe, and especially its berries, can be very poisonous. If anyone in your family eats real mistletoe, call the Poison Center immediately at 1-800-521-61.10. Our suggestion: substitute the plastic variety and kiss the real one goodbye.
