

Rep. George Hasay seeks reelection

In 1993, Hasay was presented the Guardian of Small Business Award by the National Federation of Independent Businesses, representing 23,000 small companies in Pennsylvania.

Hasay also wants to lower the corporate net income tax. He voted against increasing this tax in 1991 and is actively pursuing decreasing this tax to allow Pennsylvania to be more competitive with other states.

Hasay was involved with efforts of both Republicans and Democrats in changing the school subsidy formula thereby enabling rural schools, such as, all the schools in the 117th Legislative District to receive an increase in their funding this fiscal year.

Due to the massive square mile distance of the 117th Legislative District, Hasay maintains a Dis-

trict Office in Mountaintop, open five days a week with three different telephone exchanges to allow most of his constituency to call him toll-free and a Satellite Office in Sweet Valley next to the Post Office, open three days a week.

Hasay is married to Nancy Jane Hasay, a registered nurse. They have a daughter, Rachel, who attends public school in the Northwest School District.

Senior State Representative George C. Hasay is seeking reelection to the Pennsylvania State House of Representatives.

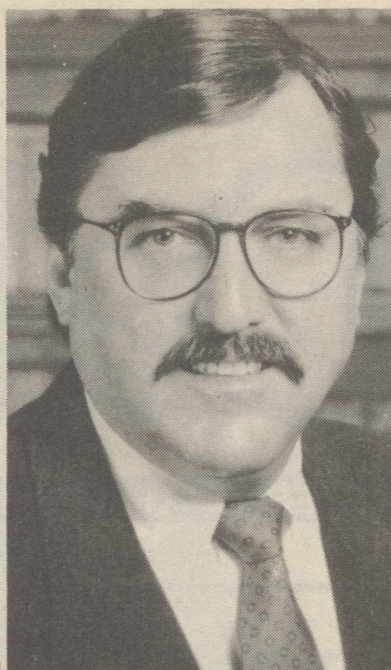
Hasay was first elected to the House in 1972, representing the 117th Legislative District comprised of much of the entire western section of Luzerne County. This year due to his seniority in the House Republican Caucus,

Hasay was appointed as the Republican Chairman of the Business and Economic Development Committee.

Hasay also serves on the House Game & Fisheries Committee and has received the prestigious "Legislator of the Year Award", presented by the Unified Sportsmen of Pennsylvania.

Hasay has been appointed to the House Republican Caucus to serve as a delegate to the Pennsylvania Wild Resource Conservation Fund. In 1993 he served as the Chairman of the Fund.

Hasay feels that one of the main areas which must be addressed in the next Session is crime: Hasay believes Pennsylvania needs less appeals, a speedier court system and elimination of some of the appeal processes.

According to Lehman Township police, Gilbert Ide, 88, of Idetown Road was accidentally struck by a 1984 Plymouth sedan Monday morning at 8 a.m.

Police said that Ide had been clearing snow from his driveway and mailbox when the car skidded and struck him. The driver, a minor whose name police refused to release, had tried to avoid him but was unable to, due to the icy

condition of the road. No charges will be filed, police said.

Ide was transported by the Lehman Township ambulance and Medic 302 to the Geisinger Wyoming Valley Medical Center, then by Life-Flight helicopter to Community Medical Center in Scranton, where a hospital spokesperson said that he is listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit.

Assistant chief Bill Goodwin investigated the accident.

She serves on the boards of the Labor Management Council of Greater Wilkes-Barre, and the Greater Pittston Chamber of Commerce.

Additionally, she is a member of the Business/Education Partnership of the Greater Pittston Chamber of Commerce. She serves on the Advisory Committee of the Domestic Violence Service Center.

Mundy has been honored for her achievements with a Pathfinder Award from the Wyoming Valley Women's Network, and was the 1993 recipient of the John Heinz Friend of Nursing Award from the Pennsylvania Nurses Association.

Representative Mundy resides in Kingston with her son, Brian, a recent graduate of the University of Pittsburgh.
