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early intervention and early childhood education," Mrs. Whipple said. "Many of the children in the day care program would be latch-key kids if we didn't have it."

She also respects Dr. Davis's philosophy that every child can learn, no matter what socioeconomic group they come from, and that every child should start kindergarten ready to begin a lifetime of learning.

Jeff Fritzen credited Dr. Davis with a lot of hard work on strategic planning and preparing the district for outcome-based education (O.B.E.).

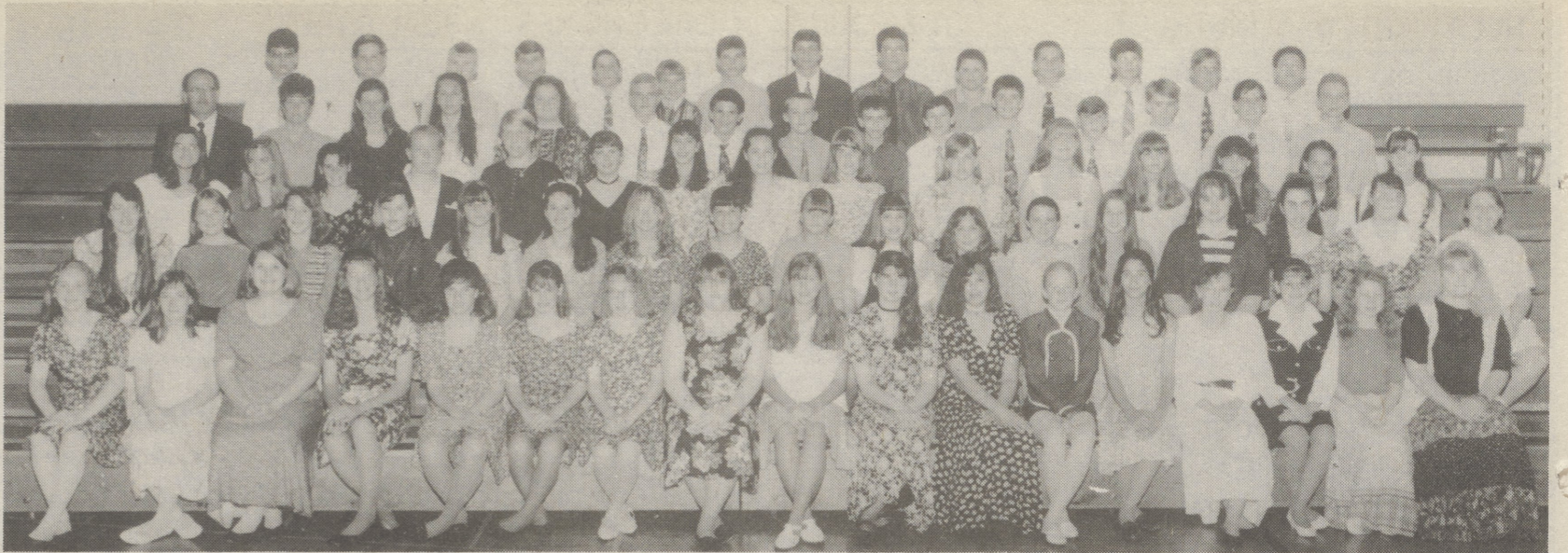

He added that finding a new superintendent could take three to six months, by the time the position is advertised, applications returned and lengthy interviews conducted.
