Club officers are Cay Gorman of Swoyersville, vice-president, and Barb Laning of Trucksville, secretary/treasurer. And of course, Mary Lou Thompson is president and founder and appreciative of this opportunity to "wave the flag" about her project. Not one to do any resting on laurels, Mary Lou says, "We can always use new members. There's a lot of things coming up so give 'em that number again...675-1910." "Try us! You'll like it!"

The Dallas Band Boosters are planning to operate a refreshment booth at the Luzerne County Fair, September 7-11.

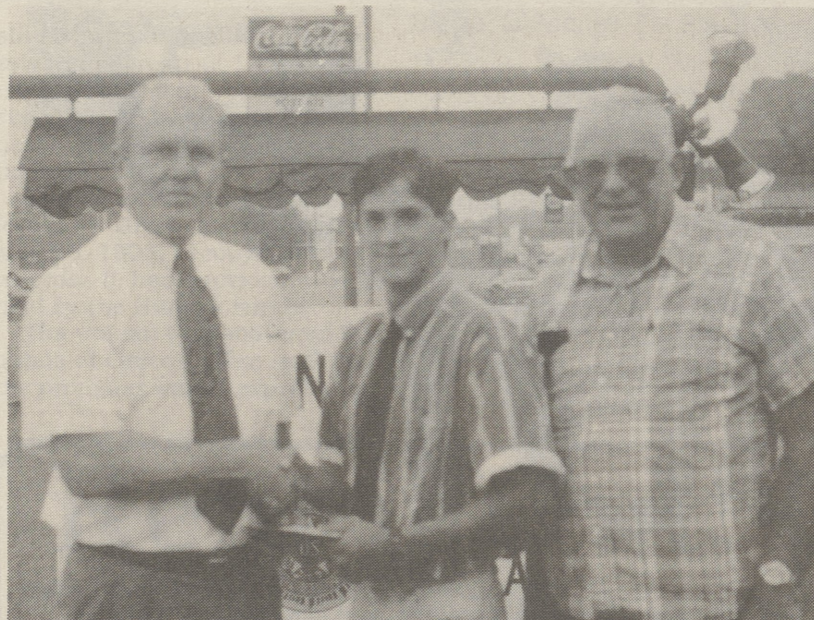
College pool to close for repairs Aug. 15

Students earn scholarships from the American Legion

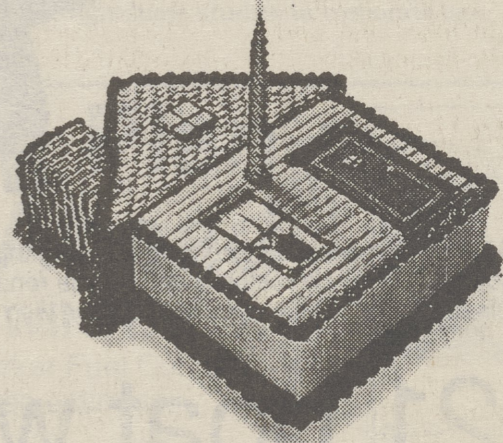
Dallas American Legion scholarships were awarded to Daniel F. Brody of Dallas High School and Joshua Bower of Lake-Lehman High School.
