Drew University has recently named Marsha Garcia to the Dean's List at the College of Liberal Arts for the 1994 spring semester.


Students of Drew University earn this honor by completing a minimum of 15 credit hours and obtaining a grade point average of 3.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale.
