Mounts shut out Comets

The Dallas Mountaineers dominated Crestwood last Saturday, cruising to a 28-0 win over the Comets for their fourth straight win of the season.

Steve Button set the pattern for the Mountaineer defense early in the first quarter when he sacked Comet quarterback Kevin Zurawski in the backfield.

Buddy Rhodes set up the first Dallas score with a tremendous 64-yard run from the Mountaineer 23-yard line late in the first quarter. Rhodes finished the drive with a six-yard touchdown run. Jeff Kunkle kicked the extra point to give Dallas a 7-0 lead.

After stopping the Comets on their next possession, Dallas scored again on a 55-yard pass play from quarterback Ted Jackson to Rich Klick. The scor-Ing play was set up by an earlier completion from Jackson to Rich Butcofski. Kunkle again kicked the PAT for a 14-0 Dallas lead.

Klick intercepted a Zurawski pass on the next Comet series, but a Crestwood interception gave the ball back to Crestwood on the Dallas 42-yard line. The Mountaineers stopped this drive as well when Button sacked Zurawski again and Klick provided superb bass coverage that broke up a pass into the endzone.

Jackson then picked off another Comet pass near the endzone and ran the ball past midfield. Dallas retained possession for the remainder of the first half.

Crestwood's offense posed no threat in the second half, as their drives were held to minimal gains 🕞 y a tight Dallas defense.

The first Mountaineer possession of the half led to another Dallas score, when Rich Butcofski

Crestwood 13-yard line. After a nine-yard gain by Klick and three more from Butcofski, Rhodes punched it in from the one-yard line. Kunkle's fourth PAT made the final score 28-0.

Head coach Ted Jackson had kind words for the winless Comets. "We came out a little tight, a little flat" he said after the game. "Crestwood came ready to play."

Despite scoring two Dallas touchdowns, senior Buddy Rhodes wasn't satisfied. "For the rest of the year, we're just going to take it one game at a time," he said. "Myself, I don't feel I played that well today. I'm a little banged up. A couple of the guys are banged up. We're just going to try

to keep improving every week." Butcofski praised the Comet defense. "They're a really good team, but I think we did well. They're big, strong.. they didn't have a very good offense. They had a good defense.' Jackson and his players may have felt their opponent was in better condition for the game, but that didn't seem to matter as the Mounts easily advanced their record to 4-0.
