Back Mountain Reelers open Contra Dance series

The Folklore Society of Northeastern Pennsylvania and the Chicory House of Wilkes-Barre will hold their monthly New England Contra Dance October 8 at 7 p.m. in "Fellowship Hall" of the First Presbyterian Church, 97 South Franklin Street in downtown Wilkes-Barre.

Beginners, singles, couples, young and old are all welcome. The evening will begin with the customary walk-through of

basic dance figures. Each dance will be taught throughout the evening. Dancers should wear soft-soled shoes or sneakers, and casual dress.

The evening's caller will be Sam Rotenberg, who will introduce some English country dances (more genteel, less aerobic) as well as calling a full complement of contras. Making their season debut is the region's New England dance band, the Back Moun-

tain Reelers, who will supply the music for many of the monthly dances. The group has grown to eight members: three fiddlers; the energetic 14-year-old Ian Warrington and duelling fiddlers Andy Fedley and Brian Redmond.

Classically trained Margaret Bakker plays cello, while on banjo is clawhammer stylist Paul Mehl. Rob Lewis plays guitar and doubles as percussion on bodhran and other

instruments. Accordionist Dave Gonzolo plays the squeezebox.

Reelers organizer Mary Lou Mehl plays hammered dulcimer, recorder and backup piano.

Admission is \$6 for adults (\$5 for Chicory House or Folklore Society members), \$3 for children age 10 to 16, or \$15 for families.
