No nite parking on KT streets

Kingston Township chief of police James Balavage reminds township residents that the winter parking ordinance restrictions begin November 2.

Parking is prohibited on all streets from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. through March 31, 1995, so that the streets are free of parked vehicles to facilitate snow removal.

The newly revised parking restrictions prohibit parking on all streets from the beginning of a snow or ice storm until eight hours after it ends. The chief encourages residents to comply with these restrictions to avoid parking citations.
