Jessica Fried, a senior at Wyoming Seminary, was recently recognized as the Kingston Lions Club Student of the Month for January.

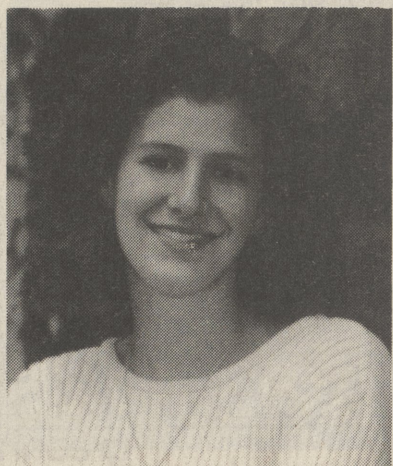

Slaff named Sem student of the month for February

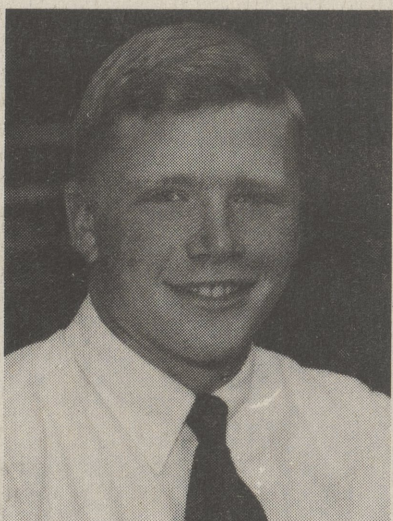
Randolph E. Slaff, a senior at Wyoming Seminary, was named Student of the Month for February by the Kingston Lions Club.
