Dallas resident Shirley Smith, clinical specialist (oncology) and hospice coordinator at the Wilkes-Barre Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center, has been notified of her selection for the annual "Quality of Life Lectureship" Award, by the Oncology Nursing Society (ONS), a large organization of nurses involved in cancer care.

Mrs. Smith is well known for programs she has initiated for improvements in cancer care, including outpatient chemotherapy clinics, support programs and liaison with community agencies. Mrs. Smith initiated and coordinates the hospice program at the VA Medical Center, which has been commended as a model program and has served as a training and resource center for other medical centers starting up new programs.
