# **District will take over** special education

DALLAS - Eight special education teachers will be transferred from Luzerne Intermediate Unit 18 to the Dallas School District in September to teach learning support and speech classes.

Nancy Biscontini and Shirley Breymeier will be assigned to the elementary schools, while Bonnie Evans and Mary Fran Thomas will work in the middle school. Barbara Deeb, Joanna Drayer and Mary Cosgrove Kratz will be assigned to the high school. Speech teacher Ellen Morrissey will work with all grades.

They will keep their seniority in pay, earning salaries ranging from \$45,568 to \$53,776, based on education and years of experience.

One position is still open, according to superintendent Gerald Wycallis.

The board set hourly wages for

custodial/maintenance workers at \$5.50 and gave raises of 51/2percent to confidential employees who handle payroll, negotiations and other sensitive information in the central office.

Chris Cimakosky will earn \$20,280, while secretary Janet Evans will earn \$19,954, Mollie Phillips will earn \$14,268 and business office secretary Carole Williams will earn \$15,662.

A list of coaches and nonprofessional substitute employees was approved.

The board also appointed Eastern Insurance Group as workers' compensation insurance provider for \$70,584, J. P. Mascaro and Sons as trash hauler for \$15,949 and school tax collectors for its four member municipalities.

The board will hold a budget meeting at 7 p.m. June 27 and an education committee meeting at 7 p.m. July 7 before the regular board meeting

"It's nice up here," she said. "Everyone gets along well and it's warm. The food is good too." Her secret for long life?


