available for students with special needs. Identification

Students who are experiencing difficulty in school are referred for assistance by school personnel through the guidance counselor. Parents who suspect that their child may be exceptional and in need of special education should contact the principal or guidance counselor in the child's building. The school district Special Education office may be contacted as well.

#### Programs

Children with special needs who are identified as exceptional may be eligible for special education programs and/or related services. Special education programs are offered through the district or by contract with Luzerne Intermediate Unit in surrounding school. district locations. Students with learning, behavioral or health/physical needs may receive services in a variety of programs; Gifted Support, Learning Support, Emotional Support, Physical Support, Life Skills Support, Multiple Disabilities Support, Deaf and Hearing Impaired Support, Blind and Visually Impaired Support, Autistic Support. In addition, related services are offered when necessary to support special needs students in regular or special education classes. These services are: Speech and Language Support, Vision Support, Hearing Support, Orientation and Mobility, Assistive Technology

#### **Screening Procedures**

Prior to consideration of a formal, individualized evaluation or Special Education services, screening activities are conducted in an attempt to obtain as much information as is available on the child. Level 1 screening reviews the student's cumulative file and obtains observations from the classroom teacher. Level 2 screening consists of the usual vision and hearing screening done periodically by the school nurse. Any diffiucities noted are reported to parents who then seek medical intervention. Level 3 screening in Lake-Lehman School District is accomplished through Instructional Support in elementary and middle level buildings. This is a support offered to all students who are experiencing classroom difficulty. Children are given informal screening by appropriate personnel for learning, motor, communication and behavioral difficulties. Parents are notified if their child is in need of Instructional Support and are asked to participate in the planning conference. Strategies suggested by the whole Instructional Suport Team are then implemented by the classroom teacher with the goal of maintaining the student in his regular class setting. **Multidisciplinary Evaluation** 

Should Instructional Support strategies be insufficient to maintain the child, and allow him or her to obtain reasonable success in regular curriculum, a second level of intervention is offered, that being assessment of the child's need by the full multidisciplinary team (MDT). This team, which includes the parent or guardian, conducts a full evaluation of the child. Parent input is required in this evaluation. Teachers complete questionnaires and maintain work samples. Assessment is completed using curriculum-based and formal testing instruments. Notice of rights is given to parents and their permission is required prior to a multidisciplinary evaluation. A Comprehensive Evaluation Report is shared with all team members. Recommendations are made as to needed programs and services. An Individualized Education Plan (IEP) Team is called to determine if the student is exceptional and in need of specially designed instruction (Special Education).

Confidentiality Lake-Lehman School District protects the confidentiality of personally indentifiable information at the collection, storage, disclosure and destruction stages of that information. Parents and students who have reached the age of 18, may request, in writing, to inspect, review or copy education records maintained on the student. Information may be released only with parent consent with the exception of releasing records to another school which the student attends or will attend
