Library to host discussion. on women's literature

Sept. 22 registration deadline, limit of 20

The Back Mountain Memorial Library, Dallas, will host a reading-and-discussion group on women's literature through a program developed by the Pennsylvania Humanities Council. The Library is the first in Luzerne County to take advantage of this program.

The group will meet at the library at 96 Huntsville Road, Dallas, for six Mondays, October 23, November 6, November 20, December 4, January 15 and January 29, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

The program, entitled Through Women's Eyes III: From Girls to Women, explores the experience of girls growing up in a variety of cultures. Involved are the kinds of ceremonies and traditions which mark the transition from girlhood to womanhood, and what the different expectations about education, work, independence, love and family are. Readings include: Ellen Foster by Kaye Gibbons; Browngirl Brownstones, by Paule Marshall; and A Tree Grows in Brooklyn, by Betty Smith and others.

The discussions will be led, by Patricia Hinchey, who received Bachelor's and Master's degrees in English Education from Wilkes University, and her doctorate in **English Education from Teachers** College, Columbia University, New York City. She is an Assistant Professor of Education at Penn State Worthington Campus, Scranton, and has had experience in leading the Through Women's Eyes discussion group.

Participants will receive their own copies of the books to be discussed. There is a \$20 registration fee for the sessions. The group will be limited to 20 persons. Registrations will be taken on Friday, Sept. 22 ONLY, at the Back Mountain Memorial Library, 96 Huntsville Road, Dallas from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Checks must accompany registration, and should be made payable to the library.
