A little Old Shoe history

The Old Shoe began in 1948, when the Dallas Rotary Club announced: "In a concerted effort to bring Back Mountain communities into closer relationship with one another, Dallas Rotary Club will sponsor a football trophy to be awarded each year to the outstanding football team in the area."

At the time there were still several separate high schools in the region. The first winner was decided by the Thanksgiving Day game between Dallas Township and Kingston Township. Kingston Township came away with a 14-0 win, helped by a touchdown on a Statue of Liberty play. Left end Bob Morgan swung around, took the ball from the quarterback and tossed a 30-yard pass to right end Dick Handley for the score.

The bronzed football shoe that is the trophy was suggested by Rotarian Donald Clark.

"Rotary hopes by creating this award to develop a stronger competitive feeling among Back Mountain teams, and at the same time to help them to know their neighboring communities much better," said an article in the November 19, 1948 issue of The Dallas Post.

New Kings of the (Back) Mountain

EDWARDSVILLE - The Lake-Lehman field hockey team combined strong offensive pursuit with Premendous hustle and desire to dethrone 5-time defending champion Dallas at the District 2, Class AA field hockey championship Saturday. The Lady Knights shutout their arch rivals 2-0 in a game played at Ralston Field, Kirby Park.

"We have really worked on conditioning and it came out to-day," said Lehman head coach ean Lipski. "This team has intense desire, they're focused and they have a great maturity. It showed on the field today; they were just incredible."

The victory allows Lehman to advance to the state playoffs for the first time since 1989. State playoff action kicks off Tuesday, November 7th with the round of "Sweet 16." Sixteen teams in both Class AA and AAA will have earned to right to advance to Pennsylvania's finale. Only the champion from District 2 moves on, and the Lady Knights will host a fourthplace team from District 3. The "home" game will be played at a yet undetermined field within the District 2 area.

It's the first district title for Lake-Lehman field hockey since 1984. The squad, loaded with underclassmen, was thrilled to finally put the jinx to rest.

John Slaby of Dallas was the local winner in the ninth week of the 1995 Power Points football contest. His score of 104 points topped all local entries.


Slaby will receive \$25 cash from The Dallas Post and a free month of HBO from Tele-Media, the contest co-sponsor.
