Woman to be tried for forgery

Multiple charges of forgery, theft by deception and receiving stolen property against Shavertown resident Stephanie Siegel, 19, were waived to Luzerne County Criminal Court after a preliminary hearing November 9 before District Justice James Tupper.

The charges stemmed from an incident September 29, in which Thomas Mertz, the manager of Mr. Z's supermarket in Dallas, reported to police that Siegel had cashed two checks belonging to Linda Murphy for \$250 each, according to court records.

Additional charges of theft by unlawful taking were dismissed, according to court records.

Dallas resident Joseph M. Smee, 43, waived his right to a preliminary hearing November 9 before District Justice James Tupper on charges of driving while under the influence.

After failing field sobriety tests, Smee took a blood test which showed his blood alcohol level to be .266, more than twice the legal limit of .10.

Other D.U.I. charges and citations for not carrying a driver's license while driving and failure to use a seat belt were dismissed, according to court records.
