hearing. Nearly a dozen spectators filled the courtroom.

Jay Futch of the Franklin Township Taxpayers' Association said the group plans to file the complaint again against the supervisors.

"It was dismissed on a technicality," he said. "It doesn't mean the Sunshine Law wasn't broken."

Futch also accused Redmond of threatening him after the hearing.

"He told me he would see me some night after dark," Futch said. "I find it ironic that Zeb Redmond would threaten me at a hearing on violations of the Sunshine Law in a statement before witnesses. His threat to see me after dark is characteristic of his modus operandi in the dark, in secret and above the law."

Ray Rybka, election constable, said he also heard Redmond's remark.

"Oh, I don't think so, dear," Santa said. "After all, I got every vote. That means Snark voted for me too!"

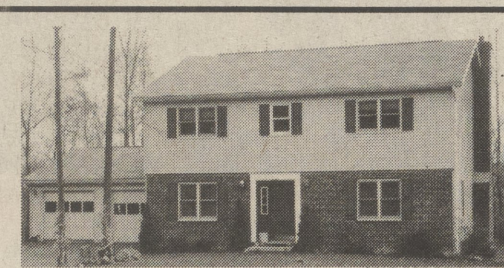

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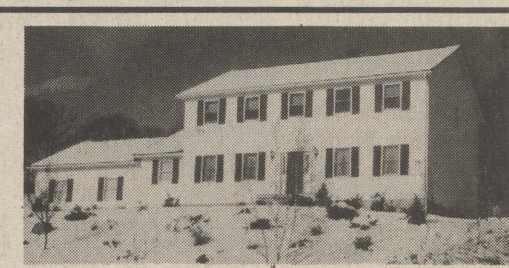
