

Charges have not yet been filed in a continuing investigation into possible criminal violations, Scott said. Criminal charges are handled by the Luzerne County court system.

The citation is the result of a three-month investigation and a raid March 12, in which LCE officers confiscated four video poker machines, three older model sixcard pinball machines, \$5,994.25 in cash, a four-column paper containing suspected payout information, two bank pouches, two blue slips of paper dated March 12 and containing the words "\$1,500 Len" and a key used for deleting points from the machine.

According to the probable cause affidavit filed by LCE investigator Thomas J. Sorokach, he and supervisor Edward J. Meade visited March 10.

On December 10 they saw a patron identified as Danny playing one of the three pinball machines and accumulating a total of 122 credits. After talking with a barmaid identified as Dorothy, he returned to the machine and

reached under it.

The machine went dark, then lit up again, with the credits reading zero. The officers saw Danny take a seat at the bar and receive some money from Dorothy. Sorokach figured that 122 credits at 5¢ per credit totaled \$6.10.

The agents then took seats at the bar near the cash register, where they saw a white sheet of paper on a clipboard and read "U Pickum and Stamp Machine," three columns and a name printed opposite entries of \$4.15 and \$6.10. They also observed a payoff from the pinball machines.

When the agents returned to the Legion on March 10, they saw several patrons entering and leaving a room with a brown papercovered window and a sign, "Employees Only," near the bar.

Meade went into the room and returned a short time later to tell the barmaid, Mirian, that he had 60 credits and wanted to cash in. Meade and Sorokach returned to and used a key to delete the cred- out," Scott said.

its from the video poker machine. She then gave Meade \$15.

Sorokach then played the machine, won 80 credits and received \$20 from Mirian, who again used the key to delete the credits.

They observed another patron identified as Joe playing a second video poker machine and accumulating 600 credits. Mirian returned to the room, used the key to delete the credits and placed a large amount of money behind a sign stating "Machine in use" on the front of the machine.


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
