'Pendragon Plaza,' at site of former auto dealership, will take shape soon


TRUCKSVILLE - A Welsh dragon is coming to the Back Mountain, but it doesn't breathe fire or consider maidens to be the ideal fast food.

It's the symbol of Pendragon Plaza, a new professional and retail facility being developed by George and Carol Isaacs on the site of the former Howard "Duke" Isaacs auto dealership on Route 309

"Pendragon means 'high chief in Welsh and was the last name of the legendary Welsh kings Uther and Arthur," Isaacs said. "My wife suggested it because my greatgreat grandfather came from the same area in Wales as King Arthur. I'd love to incorporate the Pendragon symbol into our logo."

Isaacs learned about King Arthur and Uther Pendragon from -Celtic history and the Arthurian legends, which he enjoys reading. Bids for the first phase of the development will be let in early July, with construction to begin shortly thereafter, Isaacs said. He plans to have the building ready for occupancy in January, 1997.

"We're trying to avoid the strip mall look," said architect and engineer Lynn Wallack. "The twostory building will have a tradi-

tional appearance, part brick and part plaster."

Each floor will contain 6,000 square feet of space suitable for professional offices and commercial retail establishments, he added. The Grange Bank will be

the anchor tenant. Eventually the five-acre site will house a total of 40,000 square feet of space, with two more buildings planned.

offices and retail establishments on Route 309 in Trucksville. It is on the site of the former Howard "Duke" Isaacs dealership.

Route 309 for safety reasons are included in the initial plans, Wallack said.

Before construction can begin, the entire site must be cleared of asphalt and concrete footers and the utility poles along the highway relocated. The main showroom was dismantled last year, with the former body shop and GMC truck dealership slated for demolition as the development progresses.

The Isaacs family operated a

Chrysler-Plymouth car dealership on the site at the intersection of Route, 309, Pioneer Ave. and Harris Hill Road for 58 years, beginning in 1936 with a one-car show-

room. Later the family acquired a block building from antique car restorer Tiny Gould, which was transformed into a body shop. It still sports its original "Body Shop" sign. Several small lots were added to the site in 1963 when Route 309 was widened.

The landmark blue building housing the showroom with its large front windows, parts department and car service bays in the rear was erected in 1974, with the GMC truck dealership and setvice area added in 1979.

Isaacs later sold two lots on the site's north end for the car wash and several small professional offices in the Main Line Plaza. The dealership was acquired

by Ertley Motorworld in 1994.
